| | This talk analyzes the role of Buddhist maps in the construction and contestation of worldviews in medieval and early modern Japan. By attending to the ideological implications of objects of visual and material culture and their centrality to debates over the form of the world and |

Japan's place in it, Moerman argues for an alternative historiography of Japanese Buddhism and the importance of visual representation in religious discourse. Japan's earliest world map, painted by a Buddhist monk in the 14th c., which depicts the Indian pilgrimage of a 7th c. Chinese Buddhist monk, was preserved for centuries in temples as a devotional object and transcribed by monks as an aid for meditative journeys to the distant lands of Buddhist origins. Yet the map continued to be copied, printed, and sold well into the late 19th c. with the world of early cosmological treatises augmented with geographical data from the latest European sources. It was not completely supplanted by the European world maps introduced in the 16th and 17th centuries and held its own against alternative visions of the world within the marketplace of Japanese print capitalism. The popularity of such a purposefully ahistorical religious geography long after European-style world maps were in common use reveals the unexamined but crucial role of the Buddhist imaginary in early modern debates over geography, cosmology, and cultural identity. This talk will show how, and by whom, such maps were deployed to defend a traditional Buddhist worldview in the face of European, Confucian, and Nativist critiques and to provide a starting point for religious and astronomical arguments -- articulated in texts, prints, models, and machines -- that appropriated rather than rejected new forms of knowledge.

* Lingxin Hao, Johns Hopkins University - "Rural Migrant Children in China's Urban Schools: Patterns and Conceptual Issues"

China's contemporary rural migration has brought to Chinese cities over 200 million adults and more than fifty percent of these adults' children by 2011. What are the educational opportunities for children of rural migrants? How does rural migration reshape the landscape of educational inequality? This paper unites two separate strands of theories on rural migration and educational inequality to understand the emerging new forms of inequality of educational opportunity measured by enrollment status and types of schools among rural migrant children aged 7-15. A rare source of data from a large sample of nearly all rural migrants nationwide provides this key information for up to five children of each rural migrant family, regardless of whether the children live with the parents or left behind. Descriptive and multivariate analysis finds the overwhelming importance of rural migration systems and differentially stringent policy on destinations' household registration in the changing educational inequality, manifesting the missing theoretical linkages between rural migration and educational inequality. Building on these patterns, the paper discusses the rising conceptual issues in our effort to formulate a theoretical framework guiding our next-step research on the structural and institutional mechanisms by which China's urban schools are transformed.

The **Henry Luce Foundation/ACLS Program in China Studies** seeks to maintain the vitality of China Studies in the U.S. through fellowships and grants designed primarily for scholars early in their careers. The Anne van Biema Fellowship - deadline to apply: December 15, 2012

The Anne van Biema Fellowship was established by bequest to promote excellence in research and publication on the Japanese visual arts. Fellowships support research at the Freer Gallery of Art and Arthur M. Sackler Gallery of the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, DC. Research proposals are evaluated in terms of merit, originality, methodology, and potential for significant publication that will advance scholarly and public understanding of the Japanese visual arts. Interdisciplinary proposals with a primary focus on Japanese visual arts are considered.

Awards are made to scholars at the post-doctoral or equivalent professional level for periods of two to nine months, and are not renewable. The maximum stipend of \$33,750 for nine months will be prorated for shorter terms. The fellowship includes round-trip travel at US government rates from the fellow's residence to Washington, DC. Additional support not to exceed \$2,500 may be provided for

approved research and travel expenses. Research space, a networked computer, and access to art collections, archives, and Smithsonian Institution libraries are provided.

The Anne van Biema Fellowship is intended to provide an environment conducive to research, writing, and collegial discourse. Fellows are expected to devote themselves full-time to the proposed project, to participate in the scholarly community and programs of the museums, and to present a research-in-progress seminar during the period of the appointment.

The fellowship is open to scholars of all nationalities. Meeting requirements for and obtaining required visas for residence and research in the United States is the responsibility of the applicant. Upon request, the museums will supply documentation of the award of the fellowship, dates of appointment, and financial support.

Application Deadlines

Fellowship applications are reviewed annually. Applications must be received by December 15. Notification of awards is sent on February 15. Appointments begin between April 1 and December 1 of the same calendar year.

Applicants for the Japanese language category must have excellent command of the Japanese language and may be contacted by members of the selection committee to verify this.

Deadline for 2013 - Complete applications must be received by the Foundation on or prior to February 1, 2013 to be considered for the 2013 award.
