In the early summer of 1592, over 150,000 Japanese soldiers landed in quick succession on the southeastern tip of the Korean peninsula and launched an all-out offensive against Korea. Faced with this sudden invasion, Korea's Chosŏn court sought military assistance from China's Ming court, and the Ming soon dispatched expeditionary armies across the Yalu River to Korea in order to drive back the Japanese. Together with the Ming soldiers also arrived groups of Chinese merchants, and sources indicate that they played an important role in the procurement and transport of military provisions during the Ming's war in Korea. This paper assesses how the Ming armies sought to enlist the cooperation of merchants in the Liaodong region as they readied themselves for the Korean battlefield. It also probes the manner in which Chinese and Korean sources depict the wartime presence of Chinese merchants in the Ming's logistical preparations for its war effort in Korea sheds new light on the previously little-studied link between the Ming's cross-border war and the nature of commerce in the Chinese-Korean borderland in the closing years of the sixteenth century.

	Prof. Hector Tsang has an array of clinical experience working with people with mental illness in hospital and community settings. Prof. Tsang's research interests have focused on neuropsychiatric rehabilitation for people with psychosis and the psychophysiology of mind-body interventions. His research on social skills in the workplace won the Best Cross-regional Case Study Award in 1996 at the XIVth International Conference on the Social Sciences and Medicine organized by the International Forum for Social Sciences in Health (IFSSH), Scotland, UK. In 2003, he won a US\$2 million grant from the National Institute of Mental Health in liaison with Professor Patrick W. Corrigan at IIT. In 2007, he spent his sabbatical at Yale focusing his research on neurocognition and schizophrenia. He currently serves on the editorial board of the American Journal of Occupational Therapy and the American Journal of Psychiatric Rehabilitation, and as reviewer of a number of prestigious journals including the Journal of Clinical Psychiatry, Psychiatry Research, the Journal of Alternative and Complementary Medicine, Psychiatric Services and the Community Mental Health Journal.

* Kazuhiro Takii, Professor, International Research Center for Japanese Studies - ""Kuni no Katachi (the Shape of a nation)" and Ito Hirobumi's framing of the Meiji Constitution"

	The brilliant and influential statesman and first prime minister of modern Japan, Ito Hirobumi (1841-1909), has been badly misunderstood. The son of a poor farmer, he showed exceptional talent as a boy and was sent to study in Europe and the United States. He returned home convinced that Western civilization was the only viable path for Japan. Following the Meiji Restoration of 1868, Ito became a powerful intellectual and political force behind Japanese institutional and legal

reforms aimed at shaping a modern government based on informed leadership and a knowledgeable populace. Among his many achievements were the establishment of Japan's first constitution and the founding of a new type of constitutional party, the Rikken Seiyukai (Friends of Constitutional Government). Reformulated after 1945, the Seiyukai became the Liberal Democratic Party, which has dominated Japanese politics in the postwar period. In this talk, I will highlight Ito's idea of a constitutional state using a phrase recently popular in discussions of the Japanese constitution, "Kuni no Katachi (the Shape of a nation)." Ito was the first in Japan to recognize that a constitution was not only a terse text but a practical effort to shape the nation.

Blakemore Freeman Fellowships and Refresher Grants - *deadline to apply: December 30, 2013*

Blakemore Freeman Fellowships are awarded for one academic year of advanced level language study in East or Southeast Asia in approved language programs (Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Vietnamese, Thai, Indonesian, Burmese or Khmer).

To be eligible for a Blakemore Freeman Fellowship, an applicant must:

- Be pursuing a professional, business, technical or academic career that involves the regular use of a modern East or Southeast Asian language
- Have a college undergraduate degree
- Be at or near an advanced level in the language as defined in the grant guidelines (Minimum requirement is 3 years of study of the language at college level or equivalent fluency)
- Able to devote oneself exclusively to full-time intensive language study during the term of the grant. Grants are not made for part-time study or research.
- Be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident of the United States

Blakemore Refresher Grants are intended to provide mid-career professionals an opportunity to refresh their language skills by attending a full-time language program for a summer or semester.

Applicants for Refresher Grants must meet all the eligibility requirements for Blakemore Freeman Fellowships, and be a member of one of the following groups:

• Former Blakemore Freeman Fellows;

- Professors who are teaching in an Asian field at a university or college in the United States;

Inter-University Center for Japanese Language Studies 2014-2015 10-month Program - *deadline to apply: January 15, 2014*

The Center's 10-month intensive program starts in September and ends in early June. Classes are conducted from 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM, Monday through Friday. Wednesday afternoons are reserved for extra-curricular activities. The number of classes per week is reduced during the latter half of the

program to accommodate the increase in specialized study (area studies) and tutorial instruction. Students admitted to the Center should be prepared to devote themselves full-time to language study. The workload **does not** leave time for dissertation research or for outside employment.

The Center's 10-month intensive program is divided into two parts. In the first half of the program, teaching is geared towards development of competence in constructing complex utterances and extended discourse, using Japanese accurately and appropriately in social settings, and expressing and understanding Japanese on general topics. This training provides a solid foundation for specialized, advanced language training. In the second half of the program, instruction centers on developing specialized language skills necessary for students to pursue their academic goals or professional work. Throughout the program, tutorial sessions are provided once a week for every student to deal with his or her particular linguistic problems, and to talk freely on topics of his or her choosing.

Graduate students (and qualified undergraduates) are invited to submit abstracts for the 23rd Annual Columbia Graduate Student Conference on East Asia. This two-day conference -- the oldest of its kind in the nation -- provides students from institutions around the world with the chance to meet and share research in progress with their peers. In addition, participants will gain valuable experience presenting their work through discussion with fellow graduate students as well as Columbia faculty.

This year's conference will be both a forum for promoting and circulating new ideas within East Asian studies and an opportunity to engage with fellow graduate students across disciplinary and regional frontiers. The field of East Asian studies, broadly conceived, offers fertile ground for exploring and re-inventing conventional analytical categories such as nation, society, politics, objects, space, economics, race, class, mind, identity, culture, body, art, nature, and so on. To that end, we especially encourage work that crosses national, temporal, and disciplinary boundaries to critically rethink the categories that both bind and sub-divide area studies. With an eye toward using the methodological tools of particular disciplines to make connections that are broadly applicable to the East Asian field, projects presented at this conference will be the starting point for discussions that can create new frontiers of knowledge and invigorate the next generation of scholarship.

We welcome applications from students engaged in research on all fields in East Asian Studies, including but not limited to: history, literature, political science, economics, art history, religion, sociology, archaeology, law, environmental studies, media studies, and anthropology.

PARTICIPATION:

Participants can take part in the conference as presenters or discussants. Presenters deliver a talk no longer than 15 minutes that summarizes research in progress. Discussants introduce the panelists, offer feedback, and facilitate the 20-minute discussion session following the presentations. Please indicate on your application which role(s) you are applying for. Presentations may take two possible forms: a standard academic research paper, or demonstration based in another medium. We encourage submissions of experimental work that engages nontraditional media, including (but not limited to) film, music, creative writing, and visual art. Please specifically indicate the format of your presentation on your application form.

Finally, this year's committee is also willing to consider applications from pre-arranged panels of three to four presenters organized around a specific research topic, such as a region, discipline or theme. If you are applying as a pre-formed panel, please make sure to include a topic or tentative title for your panel on the application form.
