		Beijing's extensive engagement with the developing world suggests an inexorably rising China, securing a degree of economic and political dominance unthinkable a decade ago. Yet, China's experience with its first-ever client state, Democratic Kampuchea, suggests the effectiveness of Chinese foreign aid and the efficacy of Chinese influence that comes with it is only as good as the institutions that manage such a relationship.
		When the Khmer Rouge regime came to power in Cambodia in 1975, it was utterly dependent on Chinese foreign aid and technical assistance to survive. Yet given this extremely asymmetrical relationship between a modernizing, nuclear power (China) and a pre- modern, <i>medieval</i> state (DK), China was singularly unable to leverage its power to influence Cambodian politics or policy. In this talk, I provide an institutionalist argument to explain why.
		By focusing on this historical case, I peer into the "black box" of Chinese foreign aid (which is almost impossible to do today) to illustrate how China's domestic institutional fragmentation limits its ability to influence recipient countries of Chinese foreign aid. This has important implications for understanding the limits of China's contemporary foreign aid regime and its projection of soft power abroad.

* Disasters and Rebuilding in Japan: Perspectives and Testimonies from the Tri-Co Collection

Date and Location: Swarthmore College, McCabe Library, Dec. 4, 2013 - Jan. 19, 2014 Bryn Mawr College, Canaday Library, Dec. 5, 2013 - March 7, 2014 This exhibition reflects the collaborative efforts of the Bryn Mawr 360° program Perspectives on Sustainability: Narratives of Disasters and Rebuilding in Japan. 360° programs are unique educational experiences designed to expand beyond the boundaries of the classroom and bridge between disciplines and communities. Usually taught in clusters of two or more courses, 360° programs cultivate in-depth and interdisciplinary scholarship, collaborative research, and creative community interaction. For Perspectives on Sustainability, participants enrolled in three course all focused on the history of disaster in Japan. Under the guidance of Bryn Mawr College Professor Carola Hein (Growth and Structures of Cities) and Swarthmore College Professors William Gardner (Japanese Modern Languages and Literatures) and Tomoko Sakomura (Art), the 360° students focused their research on four catastrophic events: The Great Kanto Earthquake of 1923, the 1945 Atomic Bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, the Kobe Earthquake of 1995, and the triple disaster of March 11, 2011.

> Students considered the historical impact of these disasters through their representation in Japanese art, literature and documentary film, and the effected changes and continuities in urban form and architecture. Additionally, the 360° participants grounded this larger history through primary research in the Tri-College archives and collections. This exhibition is the culmination of the students' joint efforts and explorations. Focusing on the time periods surrounding these four major disasters, the exhibit traces the lasting relationship between the Tri-College community and Japan. In three sections, the exhibit includes thematic panels addressing pertinent scholarship, a timeline of important bridges between Tri-Co and Japan, and a selection of objects from the college collections, all of which testify to the resilience of Japanese culture and the importance of remembrance, reflection, and the extension of communities beyond the boundaries of nation.

Blakemore Freeman Fellowships and Refresher Grants - *deadline to apply: December 30, 2013*

Blakemore Freeman Fellowships are awarded for one academic year of advanced level language study in East or Southeast Asia in approved language programs (Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Vietnamese, Thai, Indonesian, Burmese or Khmer).

To be eligible for a Blakemore Freeman Fellowship, an applicant must:

- Be pursuing a professional, business, technical or academic career that involves the regular use of a modern East or Southeast Asian language
- Have a college undergraduate degree
- Be at or near an advanced level in the language as defined in the grant guidelines (Minimum requirement is 3 years of study of the language at college level or equivalent fluency)
- Able to devote oneself exclusively to full-time intensive language study during the term of the grant. Grants are not made for part-time study or research.
- Be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident of the United States

Blakemore Refresher Grants are intended to provide mid-career professionals an opportunity to refresh their language skills by attending a full-time language program for a summer or semester.

Applicants for Refresher Grants must meet all the eligibility requirements for Blakemore Freeman Fellowships, and be a member of one of the following groups:

- Former Blakemore Freeman Fellows;
- Professors who are teaching in an Asian field at a university or college in the United States;
- Professionals working in an Asian field.

Boren Scholars and Fellows represent a variety of academic backgrounds, but all are interested in studying less commonly taught languages, including but not limited to Arabic, **Chinese, Korean,** Portuguese, Russian, and Swahili. Undergraduate students can receive up to \$20,000 for an academic year's study abroad and graduate students up to \$30,000 for language study and international research. In exchange for funding, recipients commit to working in the federal government for a minimum of one year.

Who is Eligible to Apply?

(1) Graduate students who are US citizens or permanent residents AND who are enrolled (or accepted for enrollment) in a program that combines modern foreign language training with international or area studies or with the international aspects of professional or other fields of study,

- OR -

(2) Undergraduates who are US citizens or permanent residents AND who have declared a major by the application deadline AND who will study a FLAS language at the intermediate or advanced level during the fellowship summer or academic year.

Inter-University Center for Japanese Language Studies 2014-2015 10-month Program - *deadline to apply: January 15, 2014*

The Center's 10-month intensive program starts in September and ends in early June. Classes are conducted from 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM, Monday through Friday. Wednesday afternoons are reserved for extra-curricular activities. The number of classes per week is reduced during the latter half of the program to accommodate the increase in specialized study (area studies) and tutorial instruction. Students admitted to the Center should be prepared to devote themselves full-time to language study. The workload **does not** leave time for dissertation research or for outside employment.

The Center's 10-month intensive program is divided into two parts. In the first half of the program, teaching is geared towards development of competence in constructing complex utterances and extended discourse, using Japanese accurately and appropriately in social settings, and expressing and understanding Japanese on general topics. This training provides a solid foundation for specialized, advanced language training. In the second half of the program, instruction centers on developing specialized language skills necessary for students to pursue their academic goals or professional work. Throughout the program, tutorial sessions are provided once a week for every student to deal with his or her particular linguistic problems, and to talk freely on topics of his or her choosing.
