

Disasters and Rebuilding in Japan: Perspectives and Testimonies from the Tri-Co Collection

Date and Location: Swarthmore College, McCabe Library, Dec. 4, 2013 - Jan. 19, 2014 Bryn Mawr College, Canaday Library, Dec. 5, 2013 - March 7, 2014

> This exhibition reflects the collaborative efforts of the Bryn Mawr 360° program Perspectives on Sustainability: Narratives of Disasters and Rebuilding in Japan. 360° programs are unique educational experiences designed to expand beyond the boundaries of the classroom and bridge between disciplines and communities. Usually taught in clusters of two or more courses, 360° programs cultivate in-depth and interdisciplinary scholarship, collaborative research, and creative community interaction. For Perspectives on Sustainability, participants enrolled in three course all focused on the history of disaster in Japan. Under the guidance of Bryn Mawr College Professor Carola Hein (Growth and Structures of Cities) and Swarthmore College Professors William Gardner (Japanese Modern Languages and Literatures) and Tomoko Sakomura (Art), the 360° students focused their research on four catastrophic events: The Great Kanto Earthquake of 1923, the 1945 Atomic Bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, the Kobe Earthquake of 1995, and the triple disaster of March 11, 2011.

> Students considered the historical impact of these disasters through their representation in Japanese art, literature and documentary film, and the effected changes and continuities in urban form and architecture. Additionally, the 360° participants grounded this larger history through primary research in the Tri-College archives and collections. This exhibition is the culmination of the students' joint efforts and explorations. Focusing on the time periods surrounding these four

major disasters, the exhibit traces the lasting relationship between the Tri-College community and Japan. In three sections, the exhibit includes thematic panels addressing pertinent scholarship, a timeline of important bridges between Tri-Co and Japan, and a selection of objects from the college collections, all of which testify to the resilience of Japanese culture and the importance of remembrance, reflection, and the extension of communities beyond the boundaries of nation.

2014-2015 David L. Boren Scholarships and Fellowships - deadline to apply: January 28, 2014

The applications for the 2014-2015 David L. Boren Scholarships and Fellowships are now available at www.borenawards.org. Boren Awards provide unique funding opportunities for U.S. undergraduate and graduate students to study in Africa, **Asia**, Central & Eastern Europe, **Eurasia**, Latin America, and the Middle East, where they can add important international and language components to their educations.

Boren Scholars and Fellows represent a variety of academic backgrounds, but all are interested in studying less commonly taught languages, including but not limited to Arabic, **Chinese, Korean,** Portuguese, Russian, and Swahili. Undergraduate students can receive up to \$20,000 for an academic year's study abroad and graduate students up to \$30,000 for language study and international research. In exchange for funding, recipients commit to working in the federal government for a minimum of one year.

Mongolian Studies (ACMS) - deadline to apply: February 15, 2014

ACMS US-Mongolia Field Research Fellowship Program

This program provides awards of up to \$4,000 to students and/or faculty from US universities to conduct academic field research in Mongolia between May and October 2014. Student applicants can be at an advanced undergraduate, masters, or doctoral level, and all fields of study are eligible. Applicants must be US citizens currently enrolled full-time in a university or college in the United States. Students graduating in the spring of 2014 are eligible to apply. Faculty fellowship supports faculty members from US colleges and universities to conduct short-term field research in Mongolia between May and October 2014. Applicants must be US citizens currently teaching at a college or university in the United States. The program priority is to support faculty from non-research intensive universities and colleges, especially faculty who are helping guide student research projects or who can show how the experience will enhance their teaching. The fellowship is supported with funding from the US Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs through a grant by the Council of American Overseas Research Centers. ACMS Library Fellowship Program

This fellowship supports US advanced graduate students or faculty members in library science or related fields from US colleges and universities to conduct short-term projects and/or research in Mongolia between May and October 2014. Applicants must be US citizens. The ACMS Library Fellowship program is to help support the development of the ACMS research library through specific defined projects designed to enhance the collection content and resource availability. The Fellow will also offer training and support for local scholars and the public. Fellows will spend up to 12 weeks onsite in Mongolia at the ACMS library; prior experience working in Mongolia is not a requirement. Fellowships will be awarded to fund travel and living expenses of up to \$4,000. The fellowship is supported with funding from the US Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs through a grant by the Council of American Overseas Research Centers. Penn Foreign Language & Area Studies (FLAS) Fellowships for Summer 2014 and the 2014-15 Academic Year - deadline to apply: March 3, 2014

The <u>Penn National Resource Centers</u> will award FLAS Fellowships for Summer 2014 and AY 2014-15 to Penn undergraduate and graduate students engaged in pursuing modern language study, *pending funding from the U.S. Department of Education.* The Center for East Asian Studies administers FLAS Fellowships for Chinese, Japanese, and Korean languages.

Applications for summer 2014 and academic year 2014-15 fellowships are due March 3, 2014.

Who is Eligible to Apply?

(1) Graduate students who are US citizens or permanent residents AND who are enrolled (or accepted for enrollment) in a program that combines modern foreign language training with international or area studies or with the international aspects of professional or other fields of study,

- OR -

(2) Undergraduates who are US citizens or permanent residents AND who have declared a major by the application deadline AND who will study a FLAS language at the intermediate or advanced level during the fellowship summer or academic year.

FLAS awards may be used by students participating in official overseas language programs, and in very limited cases, for dissertators. Please see the FLAS FAQ section of our web site, or contact the relevant FLAS Coordinator, for more information.

"Writing Chinese Translation History" - The Sixth Young Researchers' Conference On Chinese Translation Studies Call for Papers - deadline to apply: January 31, 2014

With the aim to encourage young scholars to actively participate in Chinese translation studies and strengthen academic exchange, the Research Centre for Translation (RCT) of The Chinese University of Hong Kong has organized the biennial Young Researchers' Conference on Chinese Translation Studies since 2004. Submissions of abstracts are now called for "Writing Chinese Translation History': The Sixth Young Researchers' Conference on Chinese Translation Studies", to be held in **December 18–19, 2014**. About twenty papers will be accepted for presentation, and four to five established scholars will be invited as discussants for the papers.

Applications with an abstract of no more than 500 words should be submitted on or before 31 January 2014 for the first round of screening.
