In order to understand the social foundations of the Chinese government's expansive welfare policy in the past decade and the effectiveness of that strategy on regime support and stability in China, I developed two research projects: 1) one explores Chinese citizens' preferences for government redistribution using World Values Survey data from 1990 to 2012; 2) the other project examines social policy's effects on public support of government using data from China Survey (2008) and China Family Panel Studies (2010). I will present the theoretical context, research design and empirical findings of these two projects and discuss their implications for social stability in China and political legitimacy of the Chinese government.

China represents an extreme case of larger trends in the internationalization of education. In recent years, this has included the emergence of international schools for Chinese nationals in Mainland China. What implications do these schools have for educational inequality? To answer this question, I draw on field research conducted at an international school in Beijing. I argue that international schools have emerged in China in response to features of the local educational system that introduce barriers, stress, and risk into class reproduction processes. I contend that international schools aggravate class inequality within China by giving under-performing students from wealthy Chinese families access to academic credentials and by providing an alternative route to elite education for average students from privileged backgrounds. In addition, by enrolling in international

schools, affluent families overcome institutional barriers created by the Chinese household registration system, barriers that remain in place for less privileged families. Finally, international schools introduce a new dimension of horizontal stratification -- stratification by curriculum intensity -- to the educational market in China.

Philadelphia Museum of Art Exhibit - Ink and Gold: Art of the Kano

Philadelphia Museum of Art 2600 Benjamin Franklin Parkway Philadelphia, PA 19130

Ink and Gold explores the stunning artistry of the esteemed Kano painters, the most enduring and influential school of painting in Japanese history. Established in the late fifteenth century, the Kano lineage of artists served as painters-in-attendance to Japan's powerful shoguns for four hundred years. The exhibition presents more than 120 works of art spanning the school's long and illustrious history, including large-scale, gold leaf folding screens and sliding doors as well as ink paintings, hanging scrolls, and folding fans. Ink and Gold is the first outside Japan—and the first anywhere since 1979—to so fully examine the Kano painters' legacy. Due to their light sensitivity, works in the exhibition will be presented in three rotations, offering multiple opportunities to experience the full depth, scope, and variety of the Kano painters' remarkable achievements. The rotation schedule is February 16–March 15, March 18–April 12, and April 15–May 10, 2015.

Composer Gene Coleman formed Ensemble N_JP in 2001 as a vehicle for his on going work with musicians from Japan. Through concert programs, multimedia works and educational projects, the group explores connections between contemporary and traditional forms of art. N_JP is made up of musicians who work with Coleman on a project-by-project basis. It unites outstanding Japanese and US musicians from the traditional, experimental and contemporary classical music communities, along with guest artists from Europe.

Naomi SATO was born in Tokyo and studied both sho and saxophone

at the Tokyo National University of Fine Arts and Music and saxophone improvisation and composition at the Conservatorium van Amsterdam.

Naoko KIKUCHI was born in Sendai Japan and began studying koto with her grandmother and mother at an early age and later with Tadao Sawai and Kazue Sawai. As a student at Sophia University in Tokyo, she performed in Europe and Latin America as a member of Sawai Kazue Koto Ensemble and later received a master's degree from NHK (Japanese National Broadcasting Company) School for Performance of Traditional Japanese Instruments.

Gene Coleman is a composer, musician and film director and the founder of Soundfield. Innovative use of sound, image, space and time allows Coleman to create work that expands our understanding of the world. Since 2001 his work has focused on the global transformation of culture and music's relationship with other media, such as architecture, video and dance. He was a 2014 Guggenheim Fellow and recipient of the 2013 Berlin Prize for Music. His Kirigami series is based in part on architect Jenny Sabin's research into the use of Kirigami, a traditional Japanese art of folded and cut paper, to create new materials and building structures on a nano to macro scale.

Directed by Goro MIYAZAKI, son of world-renowned animator Hayao MIYAZAKI, this feature length anime is a nostalgic coming-of-age romance about two teens who ban together to save their high school clubhouse from being demolished. Set in mid-1960s Yokohama, this Studio Ghibli film beautifully captures the essence of urban Japan during the postwar reconstruction period while exploring memories of loss and longing in the aftermath of war. The continuity in storytelling and engrossing animation style shared between father and son reflect an interesting parallel with the apprenticeship system of the Kano School.
