* Poshek Fu, University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign - "Cold War City: The Politics of Entertainment"

The Cold War was a total war. New scholarship on the Cold War has moved beyond the emphasis on elite politics, international diplomacy or military dimensions to study the cultural dynamic of the global conflicts. My talk follows this "cultural turn" to explore the missing dimension of the Cold War in Asia: the cinematic battle in colonial Hong Kong. Focusing on the "state-private" network of postwar Mandarin-language cinema, it discusses the role of popular entertainment in the battle between China, Taiwan, and the United States to win the "hearts and minds" of the ethnic Chinese communities in the region. It also discusses the ambiguous ways in which the bipolar conflicts influenced the debate about modernity and cultural tradition.

Poshek Fu is Professor of History and Law at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. He is also the Zijiang Professor at the East China Normal University. He received his Ph.D. from Stanford University. His research focuses on modern China, with emphasis on film history, Cold War cultural history, and the interaction between war and culture. He has received several national fellowships including, most recently, the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton and Fulbright Scholar. His publications include China Forever: Shaw Brothers and Diasporic Cinema (Illinois 2008), Between Shanghai and Hong Kong: The Politics of Chinese Cinemas (Stanford 2003), Passivity, Resistance, and Collaboration: Intellectual Choices in Occupied Shanghai, 1937-1945 (Stanford 1993), which have been translated into Chinese.

China represents an extreme case of larger trends in the internationalization of education. In recent years, this has included the emergence of international schools for Chinese nationals in Mainland China. What motivations do Chinese families have for enrolling their children in these schools, and what implications does this have for educational inequality? To answer these questions, I draw on field research conducted at an international school in Beijing. I argue that enrollment in the international school is a strategic response to features of the local educational system that introduce barriers, stress, and risk into educational attainment processes. I contend that international schools may aggravate class inequality within China by giving underperforming students from wealthy Chinese families access to academic credentials and by providing an alternative route to elite education for average students from privileged backgrounds. In addition, by enrolling in international schools, affluent families overcome institutional barriers created by the Chinese household registration system, barriers that remain in place for less privileged families. Finally, international schools introduce a new dimension of horizontal stratification -- stratification by curriculum intensity -- to the educational market in China.

* Young-Key Kim Renaud, George Washington University - "Korean Honorifics and Changing Language Protocol"

Korean is a typologically unusual "honorific" language. Radical transformation in Korean society over the past century has resulted in a significant change in the Korean honorific system, which is tightly related to social organization. Linguistic protocol (LP), like that for any other human behavior, reflects the cultural norm of a speech community to maintain proper human relationships, and honorific forms can intentionally or unintentionally be manipulated to express particular affective meanings, often bringing in significant structural adjustment in the language.

The change in Korean honorifics seems to indicate that Korean culture has been changing from a ritualistic, formalistic one to one in which interpersonal behavior is more frequently governed by individual character, manners, and emotions. This lecture will focus on the politeness strategies that have created various honorific markings and continue to affect the Korean linguistic protocol. Of particular interest are "panmal," literally meaning 'half speech,' gendered language use,

and "overdosing" of the subject-honorific form.

Vicki and William Abrams Professor in the Natural Sciences Randall Kamien; Penn Engineering Professor Shu Yang; Xingting Gong, C'15; Daniel Sussman, Toen Castle, and Michael Tanis, are members of a research team from the Departments of Physics and Astronomy and Materials Science and Engineering.

The principles behind kirigami, a paper-based art form similar to origami, can be applied to building things that range in size from microfluidics devices to space-based solar panels. The team will explain how the mathematical rules they've outlined for this technique show how to make all sorts of 3D structures from 2D designs. Attendees will also have a chance to make their own kirigami creations.

Expert faculty from the University of Pennsylvania shed light on their research at the Penn Science Café. It's an evening of engaging, stimulating conversation, with a Q&A session following each talk.

Since 2005, Chinese officials have successfully encouraged Chinese companies to expand trade and investment in North Korea through diplomatic support, infrastructure projects, foreign aid, and investment capital. Economic interactions with China have encouraged North Korea's localized trends toward a more market-oriented and externally engaged society. Yet for Beijing, greater economic engagement has

engendered problems of coordination, monitoring, and enforcement for local officials and embassy staff, and sparked diplomatic tensions.

James Reilly is a Senior Lecturer in Northeast Asian Politics in the Department of Government and International Relations at the University of Sydney. * Feminist Activism in China: A Discussion with Lu Pin and Xie Bin

Feminist activists in China have resorted to new media, forms of "street theater" and other tactics to publicize and protest domestic violence, gender discrimination and other issues. Five leading members of China's feminist movement were detained by authorities for disrupting social order. Their detention came against the backdrop of police raids on activist organizations, including Yirenping, a prominent Chinese NGO that advocates gender equality and fights discrimination against people with H.I.V., hepatitis and physical disabilities. Two of the detained activists' colleagues will address these issues in a roundtable discussion.

Lu Pin is project manager of Media Monitor for Women Network, editorin-chief of *Feminist Voices*, and a leading feminist activist focusing on gender equality, violence against women, and issues of gender and the media.

Xie Bin is executive director of Zhengzhou Yirenping. Ms. Xie is a colleague of three of the detained feminist activists.

Japanese political entrepreneurs have used the March 2011 catastrophe in Tohoku (3.11) to nudge national policy in the direction of their own choosing. For some, 3.11 was a warning for Japan to "put it in gear" and head off on a new path. For others, the catastrophe was a once in a millennium "black swan," so Japan should "stay the course." Still others declared that 3.11 taught that Japan must return to an

idealized past and rebuild what was lost to modernity and globalization. Battles among these perspectives on change-- and contested appeals to leadership, community, and risk-- defined post-3.11 politics and public policy in Japan, particularly in the areas of national security, energy policy, and local governance.

Ink and Gold explores the stunning artistry of the esteemed Kano painters, the most enduring and influential school of painting in Japanese history. Established in the late fifteenth century, the Kano lineage of artists served as painters-in-attendance to Japan's powerful shoguns for four hundred years. The bulk of the course will be taught onsite, within the Penn Museum's extraordinary collections.

Discovering the Museum will also provide opportunities to explore Philadelphia's rich cultural community. Students will experience a diverse array of local museums, including those of art, history, science, and more; they will receive additional opportunities to interact with local museum professionals in both small and large museums, and receive behind-the-scenes access to collections and exhibitions.
