* Pan-Asian American Community House (PAACH) - Re-Imagining Asian America: An Intergenerational Gap Discussion with Renowned Author Linda Vo

Contemporary Asian American Communities: Intersection and Divergences; Asian American Women: The "Frontiers" Reader; and Labor Versus Empire: Race, Gender, and Migration.

Join the Vietnamese Students' Association as we analyze how Vietnamese Americans are redefining Asian American communities as well as transforming the field of Asian American Studies. Although they are often lumped together and simply labeled as "refugees," "model minorities," or "anti-Communists," Professor Vo will discuss the limitations of each of these characterizations and elaborate on the diverse voices from the Vietnamese American community. She will analyze major challenges facing Vietnamese Americans as they negotiate internal differences, such as the generational gap, as well as the obstacles to creating a new generation of activists and efforts to build coalitions with other racialized communities. In this thought-provoking presentation, she considers how we can re-imagine Asian America.

Dr. Linda Vo is a professor of Asian American Studies at the University of California Irvine. She is the author of Mobilizing an Asian American Community, a deep look into the inter-generational gap, internal differences, and the minority myth model. In recent global debates over the future of Internet governance, China, Russia and a collection of authoritarian states have found themselves at odds with the U.S. and much of the democratic world. China wants the internet's future to be determined by nation-states alone, while the U.S. and a range of allies advocate a "multi-stakeholder" approach to Internet governance in which civil society, business, and technical experts have an equal say alongside governments in negotiating the rules and technical standards that will shape the future of everybody's Internet. As Chinese Internet and telecommunications companies expand around the world. Chinese government internet controls originally meant to block and monitor online activity inside the PRC have growing implications for Internet and mobile technologies all around the world. What does all of this mean for the future of the global Internet? This talk will provide an overview of the issues and the stakes, and ask what it will take to ensure that our globally interconnected Internet evolves in a manner that respects the rights and serves the interests of all Internet users, whether they live in the East or the West.


Facilitating China's economic rise is one of the central issues for the world economy. Based on his recent book *Eclipse*, the author will argue that

strategic distrust between the world's major economies can be overcome. Both sides will have to re-assess their current strategies. The United States will need to empower not contain China in the economic realm, eschewing regional and bilateral approaches for multilateral ones. China can no longer afford to follow Deng Xiaoping's advice to lie low for several decades. It will have to contribute to strengthening the international economic system, recognizing that in this course lies self-interest.

(III) Employment and Internship Opportunities (in order of application deadline)

Congressional-Executive Commission on China (CECC) - Summer 2013 Internship - deadline to apply: March 1, 2013

Interested applicants should send a cover letter, resume, and the names and contact information for two references, to the CECC via e-mail to <u>Judy Wright</u>, Director of Administration. All application materials must be submitted before the deadline in order to be considered. Please discuss in your cover letter how your professional goals, interests, and background relate to the Commission's legislative mandate regarding human rights and the rule of law in China. No phone calls please.

Those who wish to apply for internships should understand the following:

- CECC interns receive a salary of \$10/hour;
- Interns must be U.S. citizens;
- Interns may be eligible for transit benefits;
- We regret that interns are not eligible for any other Federal benefits;
- During the fall and spring semesters, CECC internships are generally part-time (15 and 20 hours per week), although we may choose to allow interns to work more hours if there are exceptional circumstances;
- During the summer, CECC internships are full-time, and we expect summer interns to work between 32 and 40 hours per week;
- Interns should have completed at least some China-related coursework. It is also desirable
 that they have some background in one or more of the specific human rights and rule of law
 issues in the CECC legislative mandate;
- Interns should be able to read Chinese well enough to assist with research in newspapers, journals, and on Web sites. More advanced Chinese language capability would be a plus.

- The successful candidate for an internship often will have lived or studied in mainland China, Hong Kong, or Taiwan;
- Interns will conduct research and writing projects on human rights and rule of law issues in China under the supervision of Commission staff. Interns may also assist with researching and updating records on the Commission's <u>Political Prisoner Database</u>. Interns may also be invited or required to attend some of the many rule of law and human rights events organized by the Commission and other organizations in Washington, DC; and
- Although our interns are usually students pursuing an undergraduate or graduate degree, others are also welcome to apply.

Following an airport greeting and welcome dinner, you will spend your first four weeks participating in a Training & Orientation program in Beijing. This comprehensive program will include 108 hours

of TEFL training on teaching methodology and practice. It also includes Mandarin lessons and cultural orientation, leadership training and access to social and cultural activities. Accommodations and meals are provided.

After a graduation ceremony and farewell dinner, you will be placed in a Chinese school (with at least one other participant). Placements are located throughout China in a variety of schools and centers, though most will be in southern China. The U.S. Intelligence Community (IC) has unclassified open source analysis units in the Washington, DC area to conduct research related to national security issues. Students majoring in the following areas are encouraged to apply: Middle Eastern Studies, Persian Studies, South Asian Studies, Asian Studies, African Studies, Comparative Politics, International Relations, Intelligence Studies, National Security Studies, Economics, Political Economy, Cultural Anthropology, Comparative Sociology, Demography, Defense Studies, Social Psychology, Public Policy, History, Political Islam, Nuclear Engineering/Physics, Computer Science/Engineering, Political Geography, Library Science, Geographic Information Systems and other science and technology fields.

QUALIFICATIONS:

- * Fluency in written Arabic, Burmese, Cambodian/Khmer, Dari, Farsi, Georgian, Hindi, Japanese, Kurdish, Lao, Mandarin, Pashto, Russian, Somali, Turkic, Turkmen, Urdu, Uzbek, or Vietnamese required. Advanced listening comprehension required.

*The work performed will involve unclassified research and will not require full security clearance processing. However, each selected individual will undergo some security processing. Final selection for the program is contingent upon the successful completion of the security vetting process. The security vetting process will not equate to eligibility for access to classified information and only allows participation in the Critical Languages Summer Research Analyst Program.

COMPENSATION:

This will be a paid position for a 40 hour work week for a maximum of 10 weeks. The hourly rate will be commensurate with education and experience. There are no benefits other than free parking. Work location is not easily accessible by public transportation.

APPLICATION PROCESS:

Asia Foundation Research Grant for Tenure-track Assistant Professors in the United States - deadline to apply: March 31, 2013

The Asia Foundation will award a competitive grant for a research period of approximately five months in China to an assistant professor on the tenure track at an American university. The award will cover round-trip international economy class airfare, visa fee, lodging, meals, and travel costs in China. Priority will be given to research on domestic issues with linkages to international challenges or research on how China is approaching new global governance issues such as foreign aid cooperation, climate change, and regional disaster management.

Purpose: The research grant addresses the need for more American scholars to conduct research and analysis on how domestic developments in China can affect the trajectory of reform, China's place in the world, and U.S.- China relations. The award seeks to foster the professional development of a young academic through on-the ground study that could lead to publications and help the individual attain tenure.

Candidate Eligibility: Applicants should be assistant professors on the tenure track, whose professional interests focus on China, Chinese foreign policy, or U.S.-China relations. Additional eligibility requirements include:

- Proven interest and past study on China and/or East Asian affairs (priority will be given to applicants who identify possible host institutions and collaborating research professors).
- Outstanding academic and research record.
- Demonstrated leadership qualities, including potential to contribute to policy formulation directly or indirectly related to the U.S.-China relationship.

Peking University Summer Chinese Language Program - deadline to apply: early deadline is February 28, 2013; will accept until May 15, 2013

CLERC has been working with Peking University, the most prestigious university in China, for 19 years on the summer Chinese Language program. With strong cooperation and consistent improvements of both sides, this program has grown to be one of the most popular summer programs for U.S. college students.

2013 Peking University Summer Chinese Language Program is a six week intensive Mandarin Chinese learning program, designed for college students or working professionals who wish to learn Chinese in its local culture. Students are divided into three levels of classes for intensive language training: Elementary, Intermediate and Advanced. Elective cultural courses of Tai-Chi, Chinese Calligraphy and Traditional Painting are also offered. Each program student is partnered with a Peking University student to practice language skills and facilitate cross-cultural communication. A variety of extracurricular activities and weekend excursions are integrated into the curriculum for a better understanding of Chinese history and culture.

FRAMING THE GLOBAL

Indiana University-Bloomington September 26-28, 2013

Sponsored by Center for the Study of Global Change, Indiana University and Indiana University Press

Global studies emerged in the 1980s as scholars, policymakers, and the general public began to take note of the increasingly transnational flows of people, ideas, and goods that have come to be identified under the rubric of globalization. Interest in global phenomena has since spread to every discipline in the social sciences and humanities, to become an intellectual touchstone in the academy and beyond. Despite increasing popular and scholarly attention to global issues, no clear consensus has emerged regarding the most fundamental definitions of terms or appropriate empirical methods for studying the global. This conference will explore emerging directions and methodologies for global research. The scholars in the Mellon Foundation-funded Framing the Global project have been addressing this question collaboratively and through their own work, which is characterized by interdisciplinarity, empirical grounding, and a concern with tracing the links between the transnational and the local in a variety of lived, political, discursive, cultural, and social domains. The conference will extend that conversation to include other scholars and practitioners with similar concerns.

We invite proposals for panels or individual papers that are empirically grounded while addressing important theoretical and methodological issues in studying the global. Scholars in all academic and professional fields are encouraged to participate. Preference will be given to papers that complement the Framing the Global project's approaches. Work that addresses public understanding of global studies, global issues, and globalization is especially welcome, as are proposals from scholars who are asking ontological and epistemological questions about their global research.

Framing the Global is a five-year collaboration between the Center for the Study of Global Change at Indiana University and Indiana University Press funded by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. Papers that show promise for being developed into books that meet the project's aims may be considered for publication in the Global Research Studies book series, part of the Framing the Global initiative.

Many observers cite 2011 as a turning point, providing both an opportunity and imperative for Japanese to reappraise their present and forge new directions for the future. This institute considers challenges facing Japan today and offers perspectives on Japan's directions in the 21st century. Among the topics to be addressed are 21st-century social trends and challenges, political reform, global Japan, lessons of Japan's triple tragedy, and new directions in culture, literature, and the arts. The eight-day program offers teachers a unique opportunity to consider how and what to teach about contemporary Japan. Teachers' work will be informed by lectures and discussions with academic and public policy specialists. The institute will feature a curriculum strand of sessions on classroom implementation presented by teacher consultants.
