Ink and Gold explores the stunning artistry of the esteemed Kano painters, the most enduring and influential school of painting in Japanese history. Established in the late fifteenth century, the Kano lineage of artists served as painters-in-attendance to Japan's powerful shoguns for four hundred years. The exhibition presents more than 120 works of art spanning the school's long and illustrious history, including large-scale, gold leaf folding screens and sliding doors as well as ink paintings, hanging scrolls, and folding fans. Ink and Gold is the first outside Japan—and the first anywhere since 1979—to so fully examine the Kano painters' legacy. Due to their light sensitivity, works in the exhibition will be presented in three rotations, offering multiple opportunities to experience the full depth, scope, and variety of the Kano painters' remarkable achievements. The rotation schedule is February 16–March 15, March 18–April 12, and April 15–May 10, 2015.

Over the past 70 years, the United States and Japan have created and maintained one of the strongest friendships and alliances in the world. That friendship has come through contentious bilateral trade disputes in the 1990s and a long period of time when the interests of U.S. companies shifted to focus almost exclusively on China. Now, both countries, and the relationship, stand at a defining moment of opportunity and challenge.

Within the next few months, the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) negotiation, involving 12 countries which make up 40% of the world's GDP, will either succeed or fail. For the United States, the TPP forms the economic centerpiece of President Obama's focus on Asia and the basis for an entirely new, high standards-based, trade relationship. For Japan, the TPP represents the best hope for reforming its economy and creating long-term growth opportunities.

Just weeks after Prime Minister Abe's visit to Washington, the Japan-America Society of Greater Philadelphia brings together a distinguished set of speakers to provide current information and perspectives on the U.S.-Japan relationship at this crucial moment.

How important is the relationship with Japan to the U.S. economy? Do we understand the importance of Japanese investment in the United States, and what is the potential for enlarging it? What would a successful TPP agreement mean for the economies of the U.S. and Japan? What is the attitude on Capitol Hill toward a deeper U.S.-Japan economic relationship, and how does it compare to attitudes around the country? How will new developments impact the U.S.-Japan-China trilateral relationship?

JESIE (Jiangsu Education Service for International Education) is an Chinese educational agency that is partnering with the University of Pennsylvania's Penn Museum to host a four-week program for Chinese undergraduate students called Discovering the Museum.

Discovering the Museum offers a broad introduction to the field of Museum Studies and to the diverse skill sets needed to work within these institutions. The program presents students with the major departments within museums: conservation, registration, curation, education, exhibitions, research, and administration. Through discussion and activities, Chinese students will build their understanding of the variety of functions within an American museum, utilizing the Penn Museum and its skilled staff as instructors. Presentations will be made by the directors and key personnel in the departments, offering expert knowledge about each topic. The bulk of the course will be taught onsite, within the Penn Museum's extraordinary collections.

Discovering the Museum will also provide opportunities to explore Philadelphia's rich cultural community. Students will experience a diverse array of local museums, including those of art, history, science, and more; they will receive additional opportunities to interact with local museum

professionals in both small and large museums, and receive behind-the-scenes access to collections and exhibitions.

Tasks involve heavy communications with various Penn Museum and other museum personnel outside of the Penn Museum, preparing hand-outs and other supporting documents, coordinating transportation, and assisting in the delivery of all on-site presentations and museum field trips.

Primary Source Summer Institute - Changing China: History and Culture Since 1644 (offered online)

What has driven the dramatic transformation of China over the past 350 years? What should students know about this economic and cultural powerhouse? The complex history of modern China and its unique place on the world stage will be the central focus for this online course, which will explore the period from the Qing Dynasty and the decline of dynastic China to the present day. In addition to the materials presented in Primary Source's sourcebook China Since 1644: A History Through Primary Sources, this course will make use of readings, videos, and web-based resources to engage educators in some of the most current scholarship and thinking on China's development as a nation state. Topics will include the early republic, communist China, economic and political changes, internal migration, arts and literature, and China's future in an era of globalization.

This course will be offered completely online and will require a basic comfort level and interest in the use of computer technology as a medium for learning. The time for completing each week's work is approximately 3-5 hours.
