North Korea is most often seen as a member of the erstwhile "second world" of (former) Communist nations, and the survival of the North Korean regime as the peculiar holdover of a political system long defunct in its East European core. But while the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK) was established under Soviet occupation and shared a

great deal with other Leninist states, the DPRK also attempted to

establish its identity as an independent and non-aligned Third World nation during much of the Cold War. Beginning in the 1960s and peaking in the late 1970s and early 1980s, North Korea actively cultivated economic, political and diplomatic ties with post-colonial nations in Asia, Africa, the Middle East and Latin America, and for a time leaders of many of these nations saw North Korea as a successful model of economic development and nation-building. From African American nationalist groups in the United States to socialist and neutralist governments in Africa and Asia, North Korea sustained a positive image as an independent, industrialized, anti-imperialist country guided by "Juche" or self-reliance. While North Korea's diplomatic success in the Third World lost ground to South Korea in the 1980s and its reputation as an economic success story collapsed in the 1990s, "Third-Worldism" remains an important part of the DPRK's identity to this day, arguably much more important than North Korea's connection to the failed Soviet experiment.

This talk is part of a longer article that challenges the common view that Zhuangzi 26 ("Waiwu") is nothing more than a ragbag of odds and ends. Specifically for this talk, I focus on the illustrious final section of this chapter, the so-called fishnet allegory. I argue that this section does not —as is often assumed—deal with the dynamics of the relation between 'language' and 'meaning,' but that it is better explained as making a distinction between two very different ways of linguistic engagement with a given social context. Rather than being inspired by a broader narrative of Daoist or even Zhuangzian philosophy, this position is the result of a reading which places this section squarely within its chapter (pian) level context. Such reading is possible because the fishnet allegory shares three sets of explicit verbal connections with other sections of chapter 26. I will explicate these connections and their key terms, and draw out the implications for the final section. As a useful reading practice in general, I wish to draw attention to the value of immediate textual context in determining meaning.

This talk looks at contemporary ethnic minority experiences in China's urban labor market by focusing on describing the 'ethnic penalty' that emerges when analyzing the relationship between the educational and occupational levels of ethnic minority members. While intuitively, overt discrimination insofar as one's physical appearance or linguistic abilities, and first generation migrant status, are often cited as prevailing reasons to explain the 'ethnic penalty', the findings presented in this talk will suggest that explanatory factors such as an individual's social network, a firm's working culture, and social trust in a community are equally important considerations. Moreover, the interactive role of non-cognitive skills in minority labor acquisition will be discussed. Finally, the talk will consider the policy implications of these findings, and the lessons learned for other multi-ethnic jurisdictions.

Asia Foundation Research Grant for Tenure-track Assistant Professors in the United States - deadline to apply: March 31, 2013

The Asia Foundation will award a competitive grant for a research period of approximately five months in China to an assistant professor on the tenure track at an American university. The award will cover round-trip international economy class airfare, visa fee, lodging, meals, and travel costs in China. Priority will be given to research on domestic issues with linkages to international challenges or research on how China is approaching new global governance issues such as foreign aid cooperation, climate change, and regional disaster management.

Purpose: The research grant addresses the need for more American scholars to conduct research and analysis on how domestic developments in China can affect the trajectory of reform, China's place in the world, and U.S.- China relations. The award seeks to foster the professional development of a young academic through on-the ground study that could lead to publications and help the individual attain tenure.

Candidate Eligibility: Applicants should be assistant professors on the tenure track, whose professional interests focus on China, Chinese foreign policy, or U.S.-China relations. Additional eligibility requirements include:

- Proven interest and past study on China and/or East Asian affairs (priority will be given to applicants who identify possible host institutions and collaborating research professors).
- Outstanding academic and research record.
- Demonstrated leadership qualities, including potential to contribute to policy formulation directly or indirectly related to the U.S.-China relationship.

Call for Papers: Framing the Global 2013 - deadline to submit: April 18, 2013

Global studies emerged in the 1980s as scholars, policymakers, and the general public began to take note of the increasingly transnational flows of people, ideas, and goods that have come to be identified under the rubric of globalization. Interest in global phenomena has since spread to every discipline in the social sciences and humanities, to become an intellectual touchstone in the academy and beyond. Despite increasing popular and scholarly attention to global issues, no clear consensus has emerged regarding the most fundamental definitions of terms or appropriate empirical methods for studying the global. This conference will explore emerging directions and methodologies for global research. The scholars in the Mellon Foundation-funded Framing the Global project have been addressing this question collaboratively and through their own work, which is characterized by interdisciplinarity, empirical grounding, and a concern with tracing the links between the transnational and the local in a variety of lived, political, discursive, cultural, and social domains. The conference will extend that conversation to include other scholars and practitioners with similar concerns.

We invite proposals for panels or individual papers that are empirically grounded while addressing important theoretical and methodological issues in studying the global. Scholars in all academic and professional fields are encouraged to participate. Preference will be given to papers that complement the Framing the Global project's approaches. Work that addresses public understanding of global studies, global issues, and globalization is especially welcome, as are proposals from scholars who are asking ontological and epistemological questions about their global research.

Framing the Global is a five-year collaboration between the Center for the Study of Global Change at Indiana University and Indiana University Press funded by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. Papers that show promise for being developed into books that meet the project's aims may be considered for publication in the Global Research Studies book series, part of the Framing the Global initiative.

Most recently, he played a key role in securing the freedom of Chinese human rights activist Chen Guangcheng, whose flight to the U.S. embassy in Beijing made headlines last spring.
