


Check out this article celebrating the success of an East Asian Area Studies alumnae, Evelyn Boettcher.

Baidu (www.baidu.com), as the top Chinese web services company, covers more than 95% of internet users in China. There are more than 4 billion search requests via Baidu every day. The huge quantity of keyword searches on Baidu reflects the genuine needs of Chinese internet users and the characteristics of their information-seeking behaviors. It may also depict the reality of the society, the economy, the culture and people's daily lives in China. In a sense, the search terms on Baidu have become a good reference for the changing trends of social development and public opinion in China.

However, lacking systematic analysis, these search terms may only sporadically reflect the development of Chinese society and thus cannot help scholars see the whole picture and make future predictions. Their potential needs to be further and better explored. Therefore, by utilizing online data mining methods and with cooperation from Baidu Inc., the Public Opinion Research Center at Renmin University of China examined and analyzed search terms on Baidu. We proposed several new indexes, such as the China Social Care Index, China Public Opinion Pressure Index, China Economy Attention Index, People's Well-being Attention Index, China Social Responsibility Attention Index, China Innovation Attention Index, China Social Expectation Attention Index, China Ecological Environment Safety Attention Index, China Financial Safety Attention Index, China Information Security Attention Index, China Population Security Attention Index, China Resources Security attention index, China Public Health Attention Index, and the China Public Security Attention Index. These new indexes delineated the needs and focus of internet users in China.

Dr. Yu and his team studied the top 1000 search terms on Baidu from 2009~2012. His report, Public opinion barometer: How to aggregate and analyze fragmented online information, will summarize the main findings and discuss his experiences in dealing with fragmented information online.

For the past ten years, Field has been studying the Japanese incarnation of the international proletarian literature movement of the 1920s and 30s, focusing on the work of Kobayashi Takiji (1903-33). Takiji's best-known work, the "Crab-Cannery Ship" (Kani Kōsen) enjoyed a revival in 2008 as remarkable as it was unexpected: it was found to speak to the desperation of many Japanese, especially young would-be workers, subjected to the economic bifurcation of society. Those circumstances continue to hold and have now been exacerbated by the triple disaster of March 11, 2011. The Fukushima nuclear disaster, in particular, has irrevocably altered postwar Japan. What can the movement to which Takiji belonged and his writings bring to the world it has unleashed?

Residing quietly beneath the floorboards are little people who live undetected in a secret world to be discovered, where the smallest may stand tallest of all. If discovered, their relationship could drive Arrietty's family from the home and straight into danger.

Congressional-Executive Commission on China Communications Director - deadline to apply: April 8, 2013

The Congressional-Executive Commission on China is a bipartisan commission created by Congress in 2000 to monitor and report on human rights and rule of law developments in China. The Commission is seeking a communications director to be responsible for developing and implementing a communications and outreach strategy to increase the accessibility, visibility, and relevance of the Commission's work to key stakeholders, including Commissioners, Congress, the Executive Branch, media, non-governmental organizations, and the general public.

Main duties:

- Develop and implement a communications and outreach strategy for the Commission's key stakeholders, including Commissioners, Congress, the Executive Branch, media, non-governmental organizations, and the general public.
- Develop and implement a strategy for increasing accessibility to Commission work products, including newsletters, political prisoner records, special reports, and the Annual Report.
- Increase media coverage and raise awareness on the Hill and to the general public regarding the Commission's work.
- Maintain the Commission's new Web site and social media sites (Twitter, Facebook).

Congressional-Executive Commission on China Staff Member - deadline to apply: April 8, 2013

The Congressional-Executive Commission on China is a bipartisan commission created by Congress in 2000 to monitor and report on human rights and rule of law developments in China. The Commission is seeking professional staff members to assist in monitoring and reporting on substantive issues pertaining to the freedom of religion and criminal justice portfolios. The professional staff member will assist in assessing China's compliance or noncompliance with international human rights standards and Chinese domestic law. Successful candidates should have substantive background and/or an interest in one or more of these issue areas. Successful candidates should also possess the necessary Chinese language, English writing, and communication skills to effectively research, analyze, and explain such developments to U.S. policymakers and the broader public.

Main duties:

- Monitoring and researching Chinese and English language sources (media, government, NGO) for developments relating to their issue area.
- Identifying and analyzing key developments and reporting their significance orally and in writing, including through drafting sections of the Commission's Annual Reports, short analysis pieces, public statements, and press releases.
- Researching political prisoner cases and creating and maintaining case records in the CECC Political Prisoner Database.
- Assisting in organizing CECC public hearings and roundtables.
- Staff member also may be asked to travel to U.S. cities, China, or other foreign locations on official business.

Qualifications:

- Very strong demonstrated ability to speak, read, write, and perform research in Chinese (Mandarin) is required.
- The successful candidate will likely have worked or studied in mainland China, Taiwan, or Hong Kong.

The successful candidate will have a background in education or museum studies and will be familiar with Pennsylvania and NJ educational curriculum relevant to our school tours. This person will serve as a community liaison with school teachers and other visiting groups, managing all aspects of group tours, including conducting tours and coordinating staff and volunteer guides and docents. S/he will enjoy working with both children and adults.

InterExchange Working Abroad - Teaching English in China - deadline to apply: May 30, 2013

Following an airport greeting and welcome dinner, you will spend your first four weeks participating in a Training & Orientation program in Beijing. This comprehensive program will include 108 hours of TEFL training on teaching methodology and practice. It also includes Mandarin lessons and cultural orientation, leadership training and access to social and cultural activities. Accommodations and meals are provided.

After a graduation ceremony and farewell dinner, you will be placed in a Chinese school (with at least one other participant). Placements are located throughout China in a variety of schools and centers, though most will be in southern China. All locations have been thoroughly examined by our partner in China, who will check in with you throughout your placement. Each school will provide participants with a safe and positive work environment, with frequent contact between participant and school staff. You will receive a monthly stipend of 2,000RMB, room and board and upon successful completion of your teaching placement, a TEFL certificate. You will also be able to

take informal and formal Mandarin lessons and a school 'buddy' will assist you with your transition and day-to-day concerns.

Association of Teachers of Japanese Bridging Scholarships for Study in Japandeadline to apply: April 8, 2013

The sponsor accepts applications from American students participating in study-abroad programs in Japan. The sponsor awards scholarships annually to assist students with the travel and living expenses they will incur while studying abroad in Japan for a semester or academic year.

Undergraduate students majoring in any field of study are eligible to apply for these scholarships. Japanese language study is not a prerequisite. Applicants must be U.S. citizens and must be enrolled as undergraduates in a college or university in the United States before and during the time they are studying abroad.

Bridging Scholarship recipients receive a stipend of \$2,500 (for students on semester-long programs) or \$4,000 (for students on academic year programs). Students studying in Japan on summer programs are not eligible to apply.

Applications for scholarships for study in Japan beginning in **Fall 2013** are being accepted now, and are due by the deadline of **April 8**, **2013**.

Japanese Association of University Women: International Fellowship - deadline to apply: April 10, 2013

Purpose: To offer funding to financially help MAs, or pre-doctoral or dissertation level students and postdoctoral researchers of younger age come and stay in Japan to pursue their ongoing study/research.

Amount: ¥700,000 to ¥1,000,000 yen. The amount granted will vary depending on the duration of stay in Japan and other factors.

Eligibility: Open to women of any nationalities but Japanese, living outside Japan at the time of application. Members of IFUW and its NFAs will be given preference.

Terms: This grant is for 5 to 6 months between September 2013 and March 2014. One third of the total amount will be paid at the time of your arrival in Japan. The rest will normally be paid within 40 days after the initial payment. However, the latter amount (i.e. two thirds of the total) may be payable in two or three installments, taking into account various circumstances surrounding the grantee in Japan.

Postdoctoral Fellowship for the Ming Qing Women's Writings Digital Archive and Database: deadline to apply: April 20, 2013

The Department of East Asian Studies, McGill University, announces a postdoctoral fellowship with support from the Henry Luce Foundation to begin Aug. 1, 2013, renewable for two subsequent years. The fellow will assist the Director of the Ming Qing Women's Writings Digital Archive and Database (http://digital.library.mcgill.ca/mingqing), Prof. Grace S. Fong, in executing, managing, and developing the collaborative digitization project with the National Library of China (Beijing) and East China Normal University (Shanghai). The ideal candidate will combine knowledge of digital technology with a disciplinary specialization in the Humanities/Social Sciences, Library Information Science, or Education. Native or near-native fluency in oral and written English and modern Chinese are required; knowledge of classical Chinese an asset. The ideal candidate will have experience with application development in PHP, MySQL relational databases & data modeling, familiarity with web tools (PHP, HTML, CSS, and JavaScript), and experience working with standardized metadata, prosopographical implementations in a relational database, and be able to produce technical documentation in English to support their work. The successful candidate will also have the opportunity to teach one course in the general area of Chinese digital humanities studies depending on their expertise.

Applicants must have received their PhD degree in 2008 or later, but must have completed all requirements for the PhD degree by July 31, 2013. The annual fellowship stipend will be CAD\$50,000. The application deadline is April 20, 2013. Applications should include:

Global studies emerged in the 1980s as scholars, policymakers, and the general public began to take note of the increasingly transnational flows of people, ideas, and goods that have come to be identified under the rubric of globalization. Interest in global phenomena has since spread to every discipline in the social sciences and humanities, to become an intellectual touchstone in the academy and beyond. Despite increasing popular and scholarly attention to global issues, no clear consensus has emerged regarding the most fundamental definitions of terms or appropriate empirical methods for studying the global. This conference will explore emerging directions and methodologies for global research. The scholars in the Mellon Foundation-funded Framing the Global project have been addressing this question collaboratively and through their own work, which is characterized by interdisciplinarity, empirical grounding, and a concern with tracing the links between the transnational and the local in a variety of lived, political, discursive, cultural, and social domains. The conference will extend that conversation to include other scholars and practitioners with similar concerns.

We invite proposals for panels or individual papers that are empirically grounded while addressing important theoretical and methodological issues in studying the global. Scholars in all academic and professional fields are encouraged to participate. Preference will be given to papers that complement the Framing the Global project's approaches. Work that addresses public understanding of global studies, global issues, and globalization is especially welcome, as are proposals from scholars who are asking ontological and epistemological questions about their global research.

Framing the Global is a five-year collaboration between the Center for the Study of Global Change at Indiana University and Indiana University Press funded by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. Papers that show promise for being developed into books that meet the project's aims may be considered for publication in the Global Research Studies book series, part of the Framing the Global initiative.
