

* Harley D. Balzer, Associate Professor in the Department of Government and School of Foreign Service, Georgetown University - "The China-Russia Reversal: Why is China Growing Faster Economically and More Stable Politically?"

At the time that Mao died in 1976, most analysts would have bet that Russia, not China, was poised to become a major commercial and industrial power in the 21st Century. China had copied many of its institutions from the Soviet Union, and lagged far behind on all the indices of modernization - including industrialization, urbanization, literacy, and manufacturing. Explaining why China, not Russia, is now competing with America as a major world power is among the most important geopolitical puzzles of our time. China has embraced globalization more fully and developed trade and manufacturing, exporting increasingly higher-value-added goods. Russia has gone through a more fundamental regime change but its economy is not as integrated, nor performing consistently well. The explanation for this surprising outcome is not so much in terms of resources, manpower and infrastructure, but in the attitudes of the key economic elites in the two countries. Specifically, Chinese elites view globalization as their best opportunity to catch up and overtake developed nations, while Russian elites are far more guarded in their acceptance of integration. The differences are illustrated by comparing leading sectors, regional development, human capital, and corruption.

Regime strategies for maintaining political control are evolving in contemporary China. The Chinese Communist Party faces increasingly

politicized challenges today. The CCP's response has been a

paradigmatic shift in control strategy toward an apolitical, less ideological approach to managing politicized challenges. China's efficiency-based

strategy for control and new culture of control warrant critical

examination.

Professor Fu's research interest includes constitutional law and human rights, with a special focus on criminal justice system and media law in China. His recent work include National Security and Fundamental Freedoms: Hong Kong's Article 23 Under Scrutiny (Hong Kong University Press, 2005) (co-edited with Carole Petersen and Simon Young) and The Struggle for Coherence: Constitutional Interpretation in Hong Kong (Palgrave Macmillan, 2008) (co-edited with Lison Harris and Simon Young). He teaches Corruption, Human Rights in China, and Legal Relations between Hong Kong and Mainland China.

> One of the major scholarly arguments in Japanese studies has been the idea that many late medieval and early modern Japanese performance genres were deeply influenced by forms of Buddhist oratory. A potential point of conflict with this intertwined genealogy is that the performers of these later art forms were often also associated with erotic exchange. One way of explaining this scandalous combination of piety and eros is to point to the performers' gender and social position -- a mode of explanation which suggests that the sensual and erotic elements of late medieval and early modern verbal arts came entirely from outside of Buddhism. In this talk, I take a new approach, proposing that erotic elements were already present in Buddhist oratorical practice and that they stem from doctrinal perceptions of the nature of the relationship between buddha and devotee, as suggested in the teaching of kannō (感

Sharmeen Obaid Chinoy is an Academy Award and Emmy Award winning documentary filmmaker. Her recent films include **Saving Face**, **Transgenders: Pakistan's Open Secret and Pakistan's Taliban Generation**, which aired on PBS, Channel 4, CBC, SBS and Arte and was the recipient of the Alfred I Dupont Award as well as The Association for International Broadcasting award.

Sharmeen has made over a dozen-multi award winning films in over 10 countries around the world and is the first non-American to be awarded the *Livingston Award* for best international reporting. In 2012 Time Magazine included her in the magazine's annual list of the 100 most influential people in the world.

The Congressional-Executive Commission on China is a bipartisan commission created by Congress in 2000 to monitor and report on human rights and rule of law developments in China. The Commission is seeking professional staff members to assist in monitoring and reporting on substantive issues pertaining to the freedom of religion and criminal justice portfolios. The professional staff member will assist in assessing China's compliance or noncompliance with international human rights standards and Chinese domestic law. Successful candidates should have substantive background and/or an interest in one or more of these issue areas. Successful candidates should also possess the necessary Chinese language, English writing, and communication skills to effectively research, analyze, and explain such developments to U.S. policymakers and the broader public.

Main duties:

Monitoring and researching Chinese and English language sources (media, government, NGO)

for developments relating to their issue area.

- Identifying and analyzing key developments and reporting their significance orally and in writing, including through drafting sections of the Commission's Annual Reports, short analysis pieces, public statements, and press releases.
- Researching political prisoner cases and creating and maintaining case records in the CECC Political Prisoner Database.

The Education Coordinator is a part-time seasonal position with the Friends of the Japanese House and Garden (FJHG) at the Shofuso Japanese House and Garden in West Fairmount Park in Philadelphia. Shofuso is a traditional-style Japanese house and nationally-ranked garden in Philadelphia's West Fairmount Park that reflects the history of Japanese culture in Philadelphia, from the 1876 Centennial Exposition to the installation of its contemporary paintings in 2007.

The successful candidate will have a background in education or museum studies and will be familiar with Pennsylvania and NJ educational curriculum relevant to our school tours. This person will serve as a community liaison with school teachers and other visiting groups, managing all aspects of group tours, including conducting tours and coordinating staff and volunteer guides and docents. S/he will enjoy working with both children and adults.

The successful candidate should also have a strong interest in and/or knowledge of Japan or be willing to quickly learn about Japanese culture. InterExchange Working Abroad - Teaching English in China - deadline to apply: May 30, 2013

Following an airport greeting and welcome dinner, you will spend your first four weeks participating in a Training & Orientation program in Beijing. This comprehensive program will include 108 hours of TEFL training on teaching methodology and practice. It also includes Mandarin lessons and cultural orientation, leadership training and access to social and cultural activities. Accommodations and meals are provided.

After a graduation ceremony and farewell dinner, you will be placed in a Chinese school (with at least one other participant). Placements are located throughout China in a variety of schools and centers, though most will be in southern China. All locations have been thoroughly examined by our partner in China, who will check in with you throughout your placement. Each school will provide participants with a safe and positive work environment, with frequent contact between participant and school staff. You will receive a monthly stipend of 2,000RMB, room and board and upon successful completion of your teaching placement, a TEFL certificate. You will also be able to take informal and formal Mandarin lessons and a school 'buddy' will assist you with your transition and day-to-day concerns.

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(IV) Fellowship and Award Opportunities (in order of application deadline)

Association of Teachers of Japanese Bridging Scholarships for Study in Japandeadline to apply: April 8, 2013

The sponsor accepts applications from American students participating in study-abroad programs in Japan. The sponsor awards scholarships annually to assist students with the travel and living expenses they will incur while studying abroad in Japan for a semester or academic year.

Undergraduate students majoring in any field of study are eligible to apply for these scholarships. Japanese language study is not a prerequisite. Applicants must be U.S. citizens and must be enrolled as undergraduates in a college or university in the United States before and during the time they are studying abroad.

Bridging Scholarship recipients receive a stipend of \$2,500 (for students on semester-long programs) or \$4,000 (for students on academic year programs). Students studying in Japan on summer programs are not eligible to apply.

Applications for scholarships for study in Japan beginning in Fall 2013 are being accepted now, and are due by the deadline of April 8, 2013.

Japanese Association of University Women: International Fellowship - deadline to apply: April 10, 2013

Purpose: To offer funding to financially help MAs, or pre-doctoral or dissertation level students and postdoctoral researchers of younger age come and stay in Japan to pursue their ongoing study/research.

Amount: ¥700,000 to ¥1,000,000 yen. The amount granted will vary depending on the duration of stay in Japan and other factors.

Eligibility: Open to women of any nationalities but Japanese, living outside Japan at the time of application. Members of IFUW and its NFAs will be given preference.

Terms: This grant is for 5 to 6 months between September 2013 and March 2014. One third of the total amount will be paid at the time of your arrival in Japan. The rest will normally be paid within 40 days after the initial payment.
