Joe Simone (Penn College of Arts and Sciences 1984) has been practicing IP law in Greater China since 1988.

After spending most of his career with big law firms, in 2012 he established SIPS (Simone IP Services) a Hong Kong-based IP boutique.

Joe has been on the front lines in advising American and European IP owners in relation to enforcement and registration of their trademarks, copyrights and patents, as well as in investigating theft of trade secrets. He is particularly known for establishing the law in China on intermediary liability in wholesale and retail markets through a series of civil actions for major fashion brands against the landlord to the Silk Street Market in Beijing. He also assisted JK Rowling in pursuing publishers of unauthorized adaptations of Harry Potter novels.

Joe writes regularly on the latest developments in Chinese trademark law, with particular focus these days on online counterfeiting and bad faith registration of trademarks.

He is also active in lobbying the Chinese government on IP reforms through his work with major industry associations, such as the International Trademark Association and the Quality Brands Protection Committee (qbpc.org.cn).

\* Edward Shaughnessy, University of Chicago - "The Method of Milfoil Divination: A First Look at the Qinghua University Manuscript Shi Fa 筮法"

Shi fa 筮法 is a manuscript contained in Vol. 4 of Qinghua daxue cang Zhanguo zhu jian 清 華大學藏戰國竹簡, the publication of Warring States manuscripts that Qinghua University obtained by way of an anonymous donation in 2008. The text is written in the form of tables and illustrations on sixty-three numbered bamboo strips, and provides prognostications for the results of milfoil divination, expressed in groupings of four trigrams each, for seventeen different topics. In addition, the text includes twelve other sections that describe associations of the eight basic trigrams produced by milfoil divination. Perhaps the most distinctive feature of the manuscript is a diagram of trigram positions correlated with the human body. In this paper, I present first an overview of the manuscript, followed by a complete translation.

Although evidence of woodblock color printing survives from as early as the fourteenth century in China, the golden age of color printing came three centuries later, with the publishing boom of the late sixteenth and seventeenth centuries. This talk first describes the development of the technology of color printing and the uses of color in print in that period, when the most exquisite examples of the art/craft were produced by literati/craftsmen for the enjoyment of a wealthy, highly cultivated elite audience. I then trace the later history of woodblock color printing through its expansion and decline. By the eighteenth century, the audience for stand-alone colored prints had expanded to include a growing "middle class" of merchants and urban dwellers interested in pictures that celebrated their prosperity. Over the course of the nineteenth century, a much broader and lower-status audience of peasants, petty tradesmen, rural craftsmen, and agricultural laborers stimulated a broad and geographically expanded market for ever cheaper and more poorly manufactured prints.

Cynthia Brokaw, professor of history at Brown University, specializes in Chinese book history of the Ming (1368-1644) and Qing (1644-1911) dynasties. Her most recent monograph, \*Commerce in Culture: The Sibao Book Trade in the Qing and Republican Periods \*(2007) focuses on the production and distribution of cheap imprints among the rural population of south China and the role that expansion of the book trade in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries stimulated cultural integration. She has co-edited two essay collections on Chinese print culture: \*Printing and Book Culture in Late Imperial China\* (2005), with Kai-wing Chow; and \*From Woodblocks to the Internet: Chinese Publishing and Book Culture in Transition, circa 1800 to 2008\*(2010), with Christopher Reed.

China's economic growth is slowing down and this is creating jitters throughout world markets. President Xi Jinping on his recent visit said this was a normal development now that China has reached middle income and is rebalancing from an investment-led economy to one based more on innovation on the supply side and consumption on the demand side. He expects China to grow at 7 percent for the rest of this

decade. But many analysts and investors around the world fear that the slowdown in China will be much sharper. David Dollar will discuss the recent developments in the Chinese economy, the progress with economic reforms that could ease the transition, and different scenarios going forward.

David Dollar is a Senior Fellow in the John L. Thornton China Center at the Brookings Institution. Prior to joining Brookings, Dollar was the U.S. Treasury's Economic and Financial Emissary to China, based in the U.S. embassy in Beijing (2009-2013). In that capacity he facilitated the macroeconomic and financial policy dialogue between U.S. and Chinese policy-makers. Prior to joining Treasury Dollar worked 20 years for the World Bank. Most recently he served as Country Director for China and Mongolia, based in Beijing (2004-2009). His other World Bank operational assignments primarily focused on Asian economies, including South Korea, Vietnam, Cambodia, Thailand, Bangladesh, and India. From 1995 to 2004 Dollar worked in the World Bank's research department. His published research focuses on economic reform in China, globalization, and economic growth. Prior to joining the World Bank he taught economics at UCLA, during which time he spent a semester in Beijing teaching at the Graduate School of the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences (1986). He has a PhD in economics from New York University and a B.A. in Chinese history and language from Dartmouth College.

The Henry Luce Foundation/ACLS Program in China Studies seeks to maintain the vitality of China Studies in North America through fellowships and grants designed primarily for scholars early in their careers. Studies on and in China have developed over the last 30 years in the United States and Canada into a robust field, but current conditions pose daunting problems, especially for scholars just before and just after the dissertation. To address this situation, the program offers three competitions:

### Comparative Perspectives on Chinese Culture and Society - application deadline: November 4, 2015

These grants for collaborative work in China studies are funded by the Chiang Ching-kuo Foundation for International Scholarly Exchange.In this cycle of competitions ACLS invites proposals in the humanities and related social sciences that adopt an explicitly cross-cultural or comparative perspective. Projects may, for example, compare aspects of Chinese history and culture with those of other nations and civilizations, explore the interaction of these nations and civilizations, or engage in cross-cultural research on the relations among the diverse and shifting populations of China. Proposals are expected to be empirically grounded, theoretically informed, and methodologically explicit.

The program supports collaborative work of three types:

- Planning Meetings: Grants up to \$6,000 offer support for one-day meetings focused on topics selected by participants. These brainstorming sessions may lead to plans for workshops or conferences, but that is not required.
- 2. **Workshops:** Grants of \$10,000 to \$15,000 offer support for workshops designed to promote discussion and the exchange of ideas on newly available or inadequately researched data or texts in a collegial, seminar-like setting. Workshops are not mini-conferences for presentation of formal papers describing work already completed.
- 3. **Conferences**: Grants up to \$25,000 offer support for formal research conferences intended to present significant new research that will be published in a conference volume.

The program aims to promote interchange among scholars who may not otherwise have the opportunity to work together. Accordingly, proposals will not be supported for activities of scholars from one institution or that fall within an institution's normal range of colloquia, symposia, or seminar series. The program will not support regularly scheduled meetings, conventions, or parts thereof. Proposals must include at least one scholar from Taiwan as a participant.

In turn, these institutions provide language and culture training to ROTC students from across the nation, funding domestic and overseas ROTC language programs and scholarships. Working in support of Army, Air Force, and Navy ROTC Headquarters, Project GO facilitates collaborative efforts both among universities and ROTC leadership.

Since 2007, Project GO institutions have provided over 3,500 domestic and overseas summer scholarships to ROTC students for critical language study. Project GO has strengthened university infrastructure in the critical languages and created venues for communication amongst ROTC leadership and university personnel.
