

David Lurie, Associate Professor of Japanese History and Literature, Columbia University - "A Tale of Two Arrows: On the Significant Detail in Japanese Mythology"

Ironically, the prose works that are generally taken to inaugurate the Japanese literary tradition have rarely been analyzed as literary texts. Western-language scholarship generally treats the mythic narratives of

the Kojiki (712) and the Nihon shoki (720)—along with the surviving portions of the early- to mid-8th century fudoki gazetteers—as protohistorical sources, evidence for religious beliefs and folkways, or as material for comparative mythological analysis. But surprisingly little attention has been paid to how these works—or at least certain key parts of them—were deliberately shaped to entertain and delight their readers. By examining significant details in episodes from the first book of the Kojiki, this talk sketches out a framework for considering these early narratives as works of literature.

Fueled by charges of orientalism, current trends in sociolegal studies have denigrated Weber's insights on Islamic and Chinese law. While factually Weber mis-characterized these legal systems, concepts he developed in his sociology of law – namely, bureaucracy, charisma, and legitimacy – continue to shed light on problems attendant to the study of Islamic and Chinese law that are both enduring and, indeed, pressing. A reconsideration of Weber's sociology of law is particularly apropos when the referent for analysis is not Western law, but rather, the relationship between Islamic and Chinese legal orders. Ethnographic data collected from 2009 to 2012 in northwestern China on the Party-State's bureaucratization of Chinese Muslim clergy or ahongs demonstrates the

bureaucratization of Chinese Muslim clergy or ahongs demonstrates the different modes by which socialist law marginalizes Islamic law and also depends on it as supplement to govern ethnic minority regions.

The speculation over China's foreign policy shift on North Korea has been particularly feverish during this year's Korean crisis owing to the fact that there are new leaders in Beijing and Pyongyang and many reports suggest the two former Cold War allies did not get along particularly well. Indeed, the world has lately been wondering whether China has finally lost patience with North Korea, as the rift between the

duo have deepened since North Korea conducted its 3rd nuclear test on February 12, 2013, despite China's repeated counsel against the move. Even President Obama said publicly that China was "recalculating" its stance on North Korea. The talk will review the validity of "evidence" that has shaped the recent debate on China's policy shift on North Korea. Dr. Lee, fresh from Beijing, will go over "signs of change" on China's North Korean policy, and eventually, conclude that the available body of facts or information on China's foreign policy shift on North Korea finds little ground for support. This means that a fundamental adjustment of Chinese policy on North Korea is not happening currently and there is no indication to expect it in any near future.

Hu Angang is one of the pioneers and leading authorities in the realm of Contemporary China Studies. He now serves as Dean of the Institute of Contemporary China Studies at Tsinghua University, and Professor of the School of Public Policy and Management of Tsinghua University. He is also a member of the Advisory Committee for the Twelfth Five-Year Plan under the NDRC, a member of the Advisory Committee of the National Disaster Mitigation Committee and a member of the Advisory Committee of the Beijing Municipal Government. He was recently elected representative for the 18th CCP National Congress. Mr. Hu spent many early years in rural areas, and entered university in 1977. Mr. Hu earned his Ph.D. degree from the China Academy of Sciences in 1988 and conducted Postdoctoral research at Yale University. He has served as a visiting scholar at Harvard University, Oxford University, Waseda University and the World Bank Institute. Mr. Hu has published about 60 books and almost 300 academic papers. His latest works are 2030 China: Towards Common Affluence and China: Innovative Green Development. His awards include the Youth Entrust of National Natural Science Foundation of China (NSFC), Fudan Premium Fund of Management, Third Award of the State Science and Technology Progress Awards and the First Prize of Science and Technology Progress Awards from the Chinese Academy of Sciences.

### Blakemore Freeman Fellowships and Refresher Grants - deadline to apply: December 30, 2013

**Blakemore Freeman Fellowships** are awarded for one academic year of advanced level language study in East or Southeast Asia in approved language programs (Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Vietnamese, Thai, Indonesian, Burmese or Khmer).

To be eligible for a Blakemore Freeman Fellowship, an applicant must:

- Be pursuing a professional, business, technical or academic career that involves the regular use of a modern East or Southeast Asian language
- Have a college undergraduate degree
- Be at or near an advanced level in the language as defined in the grant guidelines (Minimum requirement is 3 years of study of the language at college level or equivalent fluency)
- Able to devote oneself exclusively to full-time intensive language study during the term of the grant. Grants are not made for part-time study or research.
- Be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident of the United States

**Blakemore Refresher Grants** are intended to provide mid-career professionals an opportunity to refresh their language skills by attending a full-time language program for a summer or semester.

Applicants for Refresher Grants must meet all the eligibility requirements for Blakemore Freeman Fellowships, and be a member of one of the following groups:

- Former Blakemore Freeman Fellows;
- Professors who are teaching in an Asian field at a university or college in the United States;
- Professionals working in an Asian field.

In doing so, we hope to provoke new questions and forge new approaches to the study of the pre-modern book.

To kick off the event, a reception and the keynote address will be held Thursday evening, November 21, at the Free Library of Philadelphia. This year's keynote speaker will be Peter Stallybrass, Walter H. and Leonore C. Annenberg Professor in the Humanities, Professor of English and of Comparative Literature and Literary Theory, and Director of the History of the Material Text Seminar at the University of Pennsylvania. The symposium begins Friday morning at the newly renovated Special Collections Center of the University Pennsylvania Libraries.
