

\* Theorizing Workshop with David Eng, Professor of English and Asian American Studies, University of Pennsylvania - "Comparative Literature and the Question of China"

In this informal workshop, we will use Professor Eng's recently coedited *Social Text* double issue, "China and the Human," to discuss the problem of comparison in the discipline of comparative literature. Starting with the premise that the act of comparison creates its objects, we will consider how this dynamic functions in studies between the West and non-West. How might critical attention to "China" help undo the epistemological consistency of liberal humanism--and the liberal human subject--as the implicit grounding for much of our work on modernity? Indeed, what is a valid grounds for comparison?

Lyle Goldstein, Associate Professor, China Maritime Studies Institute (CMSI), U.S. Naval War College & Visiting Fellow, Watson Institute for International Studies, Brown University - "Chinese Naval Strategy in the South China Sea: An Abundance of Noise and Smoke, but Little Fire"

Dr. Goldstein discusses his survey of official and quasi-official Chineselanguage naval literature to provide new insights regarding Beijing's evolving strategy in the South China Sea. Contrary to conventional wisdom, his survey reveals a surprising diversity of viewpoint in Chinese naval circles that reflects the wider debate among Chinese strategists more generally. A major theme in many of these writings is the need for Beijing to adopt a cautious and compromising policy. Other themes revealed in this literature include a distinct threat perception, as well as concern that China could be cut out of the resource benefits of the South China Sea. Finally, a troubling pattern of escalation is evident in the literature with writings after mid-2010 assuming a disturbingly vitriolic character, perhaps even suggesting that Beijing's military policy in the South China Sea could take an ominous turn in the future. Dr. Goldstein will also discuss the present direction of US policy in the region. As the US is looking to "step up its game" in the South China Sea area, Washington (and other regional actors) must realize that the "game" may develop in a variety of destabilizing ways.

The long inscriptions on bronze vessels from the Warring States tomb of King Cuo of Zhongshan occupy a distinctive position in the history of early Chinese textual genres. They belong simultaneously to two different traditions: to the earlier tradition of royal Zhou bronze

inscriptions, and to the contemporary tradition of Warring States Masters literature. Not least because of the highly self-aware qualities of the Zhongshan texts, these inscriptions help us to understand the roots of Warring States literary genres in the earlier practices of court scribes.

Sarah Laursen, Visiting Research Scholar at the Institute for the Study the Ancient World, New York University - "New Questions about Old Gold: In Search of the First Chinese Goldsmiths"

Sarah Laursen holds a BA in East Asian Studies and Art History from New York University and an MA and PhD in East Asian Languages and Civilizations from the University of Pennsylvania. Her research focuses primarily on gold personal adornments from Eastern Han to Sui dynasty (26 – 618 CE) tombs and explores how this facet of material culture reflects Chinese interactions with the nomadic populations of the northern steppe.

Sarah Laursen's project at ISAW, "Unearthing the Ancient Craft: The Art of Goldsmithing in Early Medieval China," will investigate gold objects excavated throughout China and their relationship to the metalworking traditions of Inner Asia, the Mediterranean, and Mesopotamia. This research expands the scope of her doctoral dissertation on the third to fifth century CE Xianbei tombs of Northeast China, drawing upon the methodologies of art history, archaeology, and conservation science, as well as the hands-on study of metalworking, in an effort to identify the cultural and artistic heritage of the medieval Chinese goldsmith.

Asian Arts Initiative presents an exhibition of photographs spanning the last five decades by the unofficial and undisputed Asian American Photographer Laureate, Corky Lee. A second-generation Chinese American, Lee started his photojournalistic career in junior high school when he saw a photograph commemorating the 1869 completion of the Transcontinental Railroad that failed to include any Chinese workers despite the fact that thousands of them had worked and sacrificed their lives during its construction. Ever since, Lee has wielded a camera like a sword "to combat indifference, justice and discrimination," chronicling scenes of the mundane to the explosive in the everyday lives of Asian Pacific Americans and capturing the nuances of all the moments in

between.
