* Randy Peerenboom, Professor of Law, La Trobe University Melbourne - "Revamping the China Model for the Post Global Financial Crisis Era: The Emerging Post-Washington, Post-Beijing Consensus"

The Washington Consensus ("WC"), which dominated the development world for over two decades, has been called into question on both theoretical and empirical grounds. Those countries that adhered most closely to the it have failed to achieve sustained growth, while the East Asian 'tigers' that rejected it and followed their own development path achieved remarkable growth. Many attributed the success of the early East Asian tigers to the East Asian Model, and the more recent success of China to the China Model or Beijing Consensus ("BC"). However, the

lost decade in Japan, the Global Financial Crisis ("GFC") and growing concerns that China may be caught in the dreaded "middle-income trap" have called into question the viability of the East Asian Model and its more specific China variants.

Sunny Seong-hyon Lee, Ph.D., Pantech Fellow at Shorenstein Asia-Pacific Research Center, Stanford University - "The Debate on China's Policy Shift on North Korea: Why "Evidence" is Not Evidence"

The speculation over China's foreign policy shift on North Korea has been particularly feverish during this year's Korean crisis owing to the fact that there are new leaders in Beijing and Pyongyang and many reports suggest the two former Cold War allies did not get along particularly well. Indeed, the world has lately been wondering whether China has finally lost patience with North Korea, as the rift between the duo have deepened since North Korea conducted its 3rd nuclear test on February 12, 2013, despite China's repeated counsel against the move. Even President Obama said publicly that China was "recalculating" its stance on North Korea. The talk will review the validity of "evidence" that has shaped the recent debate on China's policy shift on North Korea. Dr. Lee, fresh from Beijing, will go over "signs of change" on China's North Korean policy, and eventually, conclude that the available body of facts or information on China's foreign policy shift on North Korea finds little ground for support. This means that a fundamental adjustment of Chinese policy on North Korea is not happening currently and there is no indication to expect it in any near future.

Hu Angang is one of the pioneers and leading authorities in the realm of Contemporary China Studies. He now serves as Dean of the Institute of Contemporary China Studies at Tsinghua University, and Professor of the School of Public Policy and Management of Tsinghua University. He is also a member of the Advisory Committee for the Twelfth Five-Year Plan under the NDRC, a member of the Advisory Committee of the National Disaster Mitigation Committee and a member of the Advisory Committee of the Beijing Municipal Government. He was recently elected representative for the 18th CCP National Congress. Mr. Hu spent many early years in rural areas, and entered university in 1977. Mr. Hu earned his Ph.D. degree from the China Academy of Sciences in 1988 and conducted Postdoctoral research at Yale University. He has served as a visiting scholar at Harvard University, Oxford University, Waseda University and the World Bank Institute. Mr. Hu has published about 60 books and almost 300 academic papers. His latest works are 2030 China: Towards Common Affluence and China: Innovative Green Development. His awards include the Youth Entrust of National Natural Science Foundation of China (NSFC), Fudan Premium Fund of Management, Third Award of the State Science and Technology

Progress Awards and the First Prize of Science and Technology Progress Awards from the Chinese Academy of Sciences.

* Martin King Whyte, John Zwaanstra Professor of International Studies and Professor of Sociology, Harvard University - "Is the Social Volcano Still Dormant? Trends in Chinese Attitudes toward Inequality"

Data from two China national surveys, in 2004 and 2009, focusing on popular attitudes toward current inequalities and mobility opportunities, are compared to examine two key questions: (1) Did the continued rise in income gaps and the impact within China of the global financial crisis lead to rising popular anger about the unfairness of current inequality patterns in 2009? and (2) Did the social contours of attitudes toward current inequalities shift over the five years between surveys? Through systematic comparisons of data from both surveys, we conclude that there is no general increase in anger about inequalities in the 2009 survey, and that the predictors of variations in these attitudes had changed relatively little, with the unexpectedly positive views of villagers still visible in 2009, although a bit muted. Trends in Chinese society between 2004 and 2009, and in the personal experience of survey respondents, are used to explain why popular acceptance of current inequalities remains widespread, despite continuing increases in China's income gaps.

Fueled by charges of orientalism, current trends in sociolegal studies have denigrated Weber's insights on Islamic and Chinese law. While factually Weber mis-characterized these legal systems, concepts he developed in his sociology of law – namely, bureaucracy, charisma, and

legitimacy – continue to shed light on problems attendant to the study of Islamic and Chinese law that are both enduring and, indeed, pressing. A reconsideration of Weber's sociology of law is particularly apropos when the referent for analysis is not Western law, but rather, the relationship between Islamic and Chinese legal orders. Ethnographic data collected from 2009 to 2012 in northwestern China on the Party-State's bureaucratization of Chinese Muslim clergy or ahongs demonstrates the different modes by which socialist law marginalizes Islamic law and also depends on it as supplement to govern ethnic minority regions.

Blakemore Freeman Fellowships and Refresher Grants - deadline to apply: December 30, 2013

Blakemore Freeman Fellowships are awarded for one academic year of advanced level language study in East or Southeast Asia in approved language programs (Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Vietnamese, Thai, Indonesian, Burmese or Khmer).

To be eligible for a Blakemore Freeman Fellowship, an applicant must:

- Be pursuing a professional, business, technical or academic career that involves the regular use of a modern East or Southeast Asian language
- Have a college undergraduate degree
- Be at or near an advanced level in the language as defined in the grant guidelines (Minimum requirement is 3 years of study of the language at college level or equivalent fluency)
- Able to devote oneself exclusively to full-time intensive language study during the term of the grant. Grants are not made for part-time study or research.
- Be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident of the United States

Blakemore Refresher Grants are intended to provide mid-career professionals an opportunity to refresh their language skills by attending a full-time language program for a summer or semester.
