* Panel Discussion - Hong Kong: The Umbrella Revolution

Tens of thousands of protesters have taken to the streets of Hong Kong since late September, demanding democracy and captivating global attention. What kind of "democracy" are protesters asking for? Is it likely for Beijing to meet these demands? Was Occupy Central a good or bad idea? How have the Hong Kong government and Beijing responded to the protests, and why? Is it even correct for Western media to call this movement a "revolution"? What is in store for the future of Hong Kong?

If you want to learn more about what's happening there on the ground, as well as the legal implications of democracy in Hong Kong should the pro-democracy protestors succeed in their talks with the government, be sure to come to this panel!

Moderator:

 Professor Avery Goldstein, the David M. Knott Professor of Global Politics and International Relations and the Director of the Center for the Study of Contemporary China. His research focuses on international relations, security studies, and Chinese politics.

Panelists:

- Professor Johannes Chan, a visiting law professor and ex-Dean of the Faculty of Law for the University of Hong Kong. He specializes in human rights, constitutional and administrative law.
- Professor Jacques deLisle, Stephen A. Cozen Professor of Law & Professor of Political Science and the Director of the Center for East Asian Studies. His research and teaching focus on contemporary Chinese law and politics, including legal and political issues in Hong Kong under Chinese rule.
- Dr. John K Yasuda, a postdoctoral fellow at the Center for the Study of Contemporary China who grew up in Hong Kong. His core research interests include regulatory reform in developing countries, governance in multilevel settings, and the politics of institutional integration.

This talk presents some results of a study which assesses recent decades of legal reform in China. Constructing and analyzing a dataset of all laws and administrative regulations promulgated between 1978 and 2014, it offers a comprehensive view of the various phases of China's legal reforms divided by areas of law. It shows the continuing existence of vast normative disorder. Equally important for the understanding the current situation, this research shows that the new actors, who have been involved in the law-making process since the early 2000s, mainly target areas of laws and regulations related to public safety, public security and freedom of expression. This situation may explain the recent substitution of the official discourse on rule of law (yifa zhiguo) with that of law and order.

Stéphanie Balme is a member of the faculty at Sciences Po (Paris) as PSIA Professor and CERI Research Fellow, and a Visiting Professor in the Columbia University Law School Alliance Program this fall. At Sciences Po, she runs the "Justice, Law and Society in China" research program. She is also a regular consultant for international organizations on projects related to rule of law, public policy or human rights in China. Balme is a former full-time Visiting Professor at Tsinghua University School of Law in Beijing (2006-2012) and a Research Associate at Chinese University of Hong Kong (2003-2006). Her areas of teaching and research are: comparative constitutional law and constitutionalism, law and society, human rights, judicial studies and Chinese politics. Her latest publications include: "China's Bureaucratic Rules of Laws" (in French, RFAP Oct. 2014) and an Ebook entitled, "Judicial Practices in Original Version: Comparing France, China and the U.S." (in French), LexisNexis, Oct. 2014 (with A. Garapon, Li Bin and D. Schimmel).

Howard French, Associate Professor, Columbia University Journalism School -"China's Second Continent: How a Million Migrants are Building a New Empire in Africa"

Howard French received his B.A. from the University of Massachusetts - Amherst. He worked as a French-English translator in Abidjan, Ivory Coast in the early 1980s, and taught English literature at the University of Ivory Coast. His career in journalism began as a freelance reporter for The Washington Post and many other publications in West Africa. He was hired by The New York Times in 1986, and worked as a metropolitan reporter for three years, and from 1990 to 2008 reported for The Times as bureau chief for Central America and the Caribbean,

West Africa, Japan and the Koreas, and China in Shanghai. During this time, his work was twice nominated for the Pulitzer Prize; he was twice the recipient of an Overseas Press Club Award, and he has also won the Grantham Environmental Award, among other awards.

From 2005 to 2008 alongside his work for The Times, Mr. French was a weekly columnist on global affairs for the International Herald Tribune. He is the author of "A Continent for the Taking: The Tragedy and Hope of Africa" (2004), which was named non-fiction book of the year by several newspapers, and won the 2005 American Library Association Black Caucus Award for Non-Fiction, and was runner up for the Lettre Ulysses Award for the Art of Reportage and for the Hurston Wright Foundation's non-fiction prize. Other awards include an honorary doctorate from the University of Maryland. He is also the author of "China's Second Continent: How a Million Migrants are Building a New Empire in Africa, which will be published by Alfred A. Knopf in May 2014.

His work has been published in The Atlantic, The New York Review of Books, The New York Times Magazine, The Nation, Rolling Stone, Transition, The Chronicle of Higher Education, The Crisis, and Travel and Leisure. He is also a documentary photographer, whose book, "Disappearing Shanghai: Images and Poems of an Intimate Way of Life," with Qiu Xiaolong, was published in 2012. French was a 2011 fellow of the Open Society Foundations and is presently researching a book about the geopolitics of East Asia.

Pre-webcast Panel, featuring:

- Ira Belkin, Executive Director of the U.S.-Asia Law Institute: Prior to joining the Institute in September 2012, Belkin served as a program officer at the Ford Foundation in Beijing, where he worked on law and rights issues. His grant-making supported Chinese institutions working to build the Chinese legal system, to strengthen the rule of law and to enhance the protection of citizens' rights, especially the rights of vulnerable groups. Prior to joining the foundation in 2007, Belkin combined a career as an American lawyer and federal prosecutor with a deep interest in China, and spent seven years working to promote the rule of law in China.
- Amy Gadsden, Executive Director of Penn Global: Dr. Gadsden will be leaving her current post of associate dean for Strategic and International Initiatives in the Penn Law School. She is highly experienced in global research and policy, especially related to China, including work earlier in her career at the International Republican Institute and the US Department of State. For the past year, she has also overseen the Law School's cross-disciplinary programs. She has extensive experience at the University of Pennsylvania, having worked at the Law School since 2009 and earned her PhD in history in 2005, with a dissertation on the rule of law in early 20th century China
- Jacques deLisle, Director of the Center for East Asian Studies: Jacques deLisle's research and teaching focus on contemporary Chinese law and politics, including: legal reform and its relationship to economic reform and political change in China, the international status of Taiwan and cross-Strait relations, China's engagement with the international order, legal

and political issues in Hong Kong under Chinese rule, and U.S.-China relations. His writings on these subjects appear in a variety of fora, including international relations journals, edited volumes of multidisciplinary scholarship, and Asian studies journals, as well as law reviews. DeLisle is also professor of political science, director of the Center for East Asian Studies at Penn, deputy director of the Center for the Study of Contemporary China and director of the Asia Program at the Foreign Policy Research Institute. He has served frequently as an expert witness on issues of P.R.C. law and government policies and is a consultant, lecturer and advisor to legal reform, development and education programs, primarily in China.

Jimmy Carter (James Earl Carter, Jr.) was the 39th President of the United States, serving from 1977 to 1981. Under Carter's leadership, on January 1, 1979, the United States established diplomatic relations with the People's Republic of China. In 1982, he became University Distinguished Professor at Emory University in Atlanta, Georgia, and founded The Carter Center, a nonpartisan, nonprofit organization that addresses national and international issues of public policy. Since leaving office, President Carter has visited China 12 times, including most recently in September 2014.

Fabric Workshop and Museum Artist-in-Residence Kazumi Tanaka - "Growing Blue: Traditional Japanese Indigo in the Work of Rowland Ricketts"

Kazumi Tanaka is known for creating detailed and finely-crafted objects using a variety of materials such as wood, hair, metal, and Japanese fabrics. Recently, the artist produced a series of miniature *Tansu* (traditional Japanese storage cabinets) inspired by her memories of her childhood in Japan. The initial idea for her project at FWM was to examine what is typically put into and taken out of these bureaus.

However, as Tanaka states in her exhibition journal *Mother and Child Reunion*, "When I am looking for something, often I find something else along the way. It catches my attention completely and I forget what I was originally looking for. Ultimately, this discovery leads me to find what I am really looking for..."

Kazumi Tanaka: *Mother and Child Reunion* is the initial exhibition of FWM's ongoing series, *Convergence: Declarations of Independence*, which presents to the Philadelphia community the energy and creativity of artists working outside traditional centers of the art world. Major funding for this exhibition is provided by the Andy Warhol Foundation for the Visual Arts, with additional funding by the National Endowment for the Arts, the E. Rhodes and Leona B. Carpenter Foundation, and the Board of Directors and Members of The Fabric Workshop and Museum (FWM).

Chigusa in Context: In and Around Chanoyu in Sixteenth-Century Japan (November 7-8, 2014)

The symposium will focus on the tea-leaf storage jar named Chigusa and the broader production and appreciation of the arts within which it thrived in the sixteenth century. The jar was made in China sometime in the thirteenth or fourteenth century as a utilitarian container, and only after arriving in Japan was it admired aesthetically, given its name, and employed as a respected storage vessel for tea. This elevation in status took place within chanoyu, the practice of drinking bowls of whisked powdered tea while in a specially designed architectural space equipped with a range of objects selected for the participants' appreciation.
