The thought of Han Feizi has value and significance for China that should not be underestimated. Of course, it takes a new research

perspective and courage to face the truth of the issue. This topic touches

upon three points. Firstly, we need to overcome the prejudices of previous scholars, both pre-modern and modern, especially the

prejudices of despotism and authoritarianism. Secondly, the thought of

Han Feizi originated at the end of Warring States period, and undoubtedly it has characteristics peculiar to that era. However, it also has common values that transcend that monarchical era. These values primarily become apparent in how social rules are established and the cultural-psychological elements within the process of setting up social rules. Thirdly, contemporary China is currently ardently building a complete system of social rules, but on the level of how to implement that system, China faces unprecedented difficulties. The thought of Han Feizi can *practically* serve as a source of ideas for the problems that contemporary China faces, especially in such realms as that of punishing corruption, guaranteeing a basic level of morality, increasing the strength of punishment, and eliminating the idea that one can accidentally get away with bad deeds.



An ancient Chinese text, the Zuozhuan commentary to the Chunqiu [Spring and Autumn Annals], states that "the great affairs of a government are force and ritual." Koreans over the centuries have taken that message to heart. From the Three Kingdoms period to the present day, Korean rulers have coupled the performance of religious ritual with the use of force in order to gain, maintain, and legitimize political power. Pre-modern governments were predatory governments, run more for the benefit of the rulers than for the benefit of the ruled. It was therefore necessary for them to use both force and ritual to get the ruled to accept their subordinate position. However, even in the modern age, despite the need for governments today to abandon their previous openly predatory character in order to win popular support, we can still find evidence of

Korean recognition of the political power of religious ritual.

As a result of the Chinese government's one-child policy instituted in 1979, hundreds of thousands of babies were abandoned, mostly girls. Somewhere Between tells the intimate stories of four Chinese girls who are born to families who are unable to keep them. Instead of being raised by their biological parents the baby girls are given to orphanages and eventually adopted by American families. They grow up with "Sesame Street," hip-hop and Twitter. They describe themselves as "bananas"—white on the inside and yellow on the outside. All is well, until they hit their teen years, when their past pulls at them, and they start to wonder, "Who am I?" Documentaries have been made before about international adoption, but have always been from the point of view of the adoptive, Caucasian parents or the adult adoptee. Young minority girls' voices are rarely heard. Somewhere Between lets four girls tell their own stories, from their point of view. We gain access to their deepest thoughts—about their families, their feelings of being an "other," and their powerful connections to a past that most of them cannot recall. 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## \* Temple University: A Talk with Yasuteru Yamada on Japan's Fukushima Nuclear Crisis

The huge earthquake and tsunami that struck Japan on March 11, 2011, damaged three of the nuclear reactors at Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Power Station, causing nuclear melt-downs continuing to this day, threatening the people and environment not only of Japan but

everywhere. To date, containment efforts have been ineffective and far too slow. Yasuteru Yamada is the cofounder of the SVCF (Skilled Veterans Corps for Fukushima), composed of retired nuclear workers, engineers, construction workers and others volunteering to work in the high-radiation environment of Fukushima Daiichi to stabilize and decommission the plant, so younger workers don't have to be exposed to radiation. Mr. Yamada, the President, says, "I am 73 and on average I probably have 13 to 15 years left to live. Even if I were exposed to radiation, cancer could take 20 or 30 years or longer to develop. Therefore us older ones have less chance of getting cancer." The SVCF also advocates for improved safety for workers, and for internationalizing the effort to stabilize the plant's three reactors, and the 7 spent fuel pools at risk of meltdown with global consequences.
