Martin King Whyte, John Zwaanstra Professor of International Studies and Professor of Sociology, Harvard University - "Is the Social Volcano Still Dormant? Trends in Chinese Attitudes toward Inequality"

	Data from two China national surveys, in 2004 and 2009, focusing on popular attitudes toward current inequalities and mobility opportunities, are compared to examine two key questions: (1) Did the continued rise in income gaps and the impact within China of the global financial crisis lead to rising popular anger about the unfairness of current inequality patterns in 2009? and (2) Did the social contours of attitudes toward current inequalities shift over the five years between surveys? Through systematic comparisons of data from both surveys, we conclude that there is no general increase in anger about inequalities in the 2009 survey, and that the predictors of variations in these attitudes had changed relatively little, with the unexpectedly positive views of villagers still visible in 2009, although a bit muted. Trends in Chinese society between 2004 and 2009, and in the personal experience of survey respondents, are used to explain why popular acceptance of current inequalities remains widespread, despite continuing increases in China's income gaps.

	Fueled by charges of orientalism, current trends in sociolegal studies have denigrated Weber's insights on Islamic and Chinese law. While factually Weber mis-characterized these legal systems, concepts he developed in his sociology of law – namely, bureaucracy, charisma, and legitimacy – continue to shed light on problems attendant to the study of Islamic and Chinese law that are both enduring and, indeed, pressing. A reconsideration of Weber's sociology of law is particularly apropos when the referent for analysis is not Western law, but rather, the relationship between Islamic and Chinese legal orders. Ethnographic data collected from 2009 to 2012 in northwestern China on the Party-State's bureaucratization of Chinese Muslim clergy or ahongs demonstrates the different modes by which socialist law marginalizes Islamic law and also depends on it as supplement to govern ethnic minority regions.

	Beginning in the late 1950s,the harshness of late Maoism brought to Chinese society a bifurcation of languageclearer and sharper than it is in most other societiesbetween official and unofficial language. People spoke one way at home and among friends, and another way in public contexts. Public language, right to its grammar,fit with the political interests of the ruling authority. The Internet, though, breaks this pattern. It is the first medium in PRC history in which unofficial talk is put in public and can survive there, despite efforts at repression. This important fact has implications for how people organize, how they bring pressure, and even how they conceive what it means to be a Chinese person.

Winner of Best Screenplay at the Cannes Film Festival, Jia's latest film follows four strangers — a disgruntled miner frustrated with local corruption, a migrant worker who

makes a life-changing discovery, a receptionist at a combination sauna/brothel, and a restless youth just trying to find a good job — as they are each forced into untenable situations by the rapidly changing world around them. Eventually, they all lash out in acts of violence, disturbingly cathartic for some, personally devastating for others. Jia, renowned for his powerful, personal portraits of Chinese society, here explores the violent repercussions of the country's developing economic landscape, a concern brilliantly encapsulated in a single shot: a blood-splattered young woman, brandishing a dollar bill at her side as if it was a sword from a martial arts film. There are occasional genre trappings here, but they are only one aspect to Jia's troubling criticism of contemporary China. Brilliantly constructed and filmed, this is masterful filmmaking from one of the greats of world cinema.

Blakemore Freeman Fellowships and Refresher Grants - *deadline to apply: December 30, 2013*

Blakemore Freeman Fellowships are awarded for one academic year of advanced level language study in East or Southeast Asia in approved language programs (Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Vietnamese, Thai, Indonesian, Burmese or Khmer).

To be eligible for a Blakemore Freeman Fellowship, an applicant must:

- Be pursuing a professional, business, technical or academic career that involves the regular use of a modern East or Southeast Asian language
- Have a college undergraduate degree
- Be at or near an advanced level in the language as defined in the grant guidelines (Minimum requirement is 3 years of study of the language at college level or equivalent fluency)
- Able to devote oneself exclusively to full-time intensive language study during the term of the grant. Grants are not made for part-time study or research.
- Be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident of the United States

Blakemore Refresher Grants are intended to provide mid-career professionals an opportunity to refresh their language skills by attending a full-time language program for a summer or semester.

Applicants for Refresher Grants must meet all the eligibility requirements for Blakemore Freeman Fellowships, and be a member of one of the following groups:
