A representative will be on campus on Friday, December 4th, 2:30-3:30pm in 844 Williams Hall to discuss CCSP Fellowships, which provide funding to doctoral students focusing on China in the arts, education, humanities, and social sciences. There are two types of fellowships available:

The Research Ph.D. Fellowship offers generous funding to students in doctoral programs at U.S. institutions who are pursuing China-related research across a broad range of fields in the arts, education, humanities and social sciences. Grantees will be supported for a period of at least one semester up to two years.

The Ph.D. in China Fellowship provides funding to students holding a master's degree in a China related field who wish to earn a doctoral degree at a Chinese institution. Funding is normally available for three to four years.

* Chicago in Beijing

The University of Chicago is pleased to announce the opening of our summer Chinese language immersion program at our Center in Beijing for undergraduate and graduate students who have completed one year of Chinese language study by June 2016. Our Chicago-in-Beijing program offers qualified undergraduate and graduate students the opportunity to study the Chinese language in a completely Chinese-speaking environment, enabling students to acquire one year's worth of language study credit at the 200-, 300-, or 400-level in eight weeks.

Students in the program receive five hours of daily Chinese language instruction at the <u>University of</u> <u>Chicago Center in Beijing</u>: two hours of instruction from University of Chicago faculty, followed by two hours of small group sessions and one hour of one-on-one tutorials with local Chinese instructors. To supplement classroom instruction, instructors accompany students on weekly outings in and around Beijing to extend the immersion experience into different applied settings. Housing for the students is organized in international student dorms on the campus of nearby Renmin University in Beijing's Haidian District, "China's Silicon Valley," with its many universities, tech firms, restaurants, movie theaters, and other amenities.

For undergraduate and graduate students who are serious about acquiring Chinese language proficiency, accelerating their studies, and experiencing an immersive cultural introduction to China, the Chicago-in-Beijing program offers a distinctive opportunity to study at the University of Chicago Center in Beijing. Applications for Chicago-in-Beijing are now open. Admissions are rolling and seats are limited, as classes are kept small. Korea University Korean History (KUKH) Graduate Student Conference - *deadline to submit: December 31, 2015*

The Korea University Korean History Graduate Student Conference invites graduate students from around the world who are conducting research in Korean history to submit abstracts for its 2016 conference, to be held Friday, April 29, at Korea University's Anam campus in Seoul. This annual conference aims to provide a forum for graduate students to exchange ideas and discuss current research on Korean history. All panels will be moderated by Korea University faculty and graduate students.

The special theme of the 2016 conference is "Pushing the Boundaries of Korean History, A Multi-Disciplinary Approach." Although broad, the theme is intended to encourage graduate students studying abroad to include innovative interpretations, new perspectives, and fresh approaches to Korean history.

Applicants must be currently enrolled in a program of graduate study ("postgraduate" in the British degree classification systems). Papers must be related to Korean history.

Abstracts must be no longer than 250 words. The deadline for abstract submission is Thursday, December 31, 2015. Abstract submissions should include name, program of graduate study, and contact information.

Successful applicants will be notified of acceptance by mid-January. Housing will be available for those presenting papers.

This conference invites graduate students from all disciplines of Japanese studies to explore past and present concepts, understandings and experience of health and the body. How are these embodied in Japan's knowledge systems, institutional structures, and identities?

Possible areas of inquiry include (but are not limited to):

- healing and medical practices, systems, and technologies
- public and environmental health
- embodied identities (e.g. LGBTQ, gender, race, disability, reproductivity, aging, illness, pain, death)
- mental health
- Art/media representations of health/bodies/embodiment
- Fitness, athletics and bodily discipline
- aesthetics & affect in/of the body
- subjectivity and representation
- embodiment & futurity

This year's keynote speaker is Noriko Horiguchi (University of Tennessee), author of *Women Adrift: The Literature of Japan's Imperial Body*.

Korea Program at Stanford University: Koret Conference on "Globalization, Innovation, and Culture in Korea"- *deadline to submit: January 31, 2016*

South Korea has become an economic powerhouse, but faces multiple challenges. To maintain its dynamism and growth in the increasingly innovation-driven global knowledge economy, Korea needs to turn its attention to the more social, cultural and educational aspects of development.

Of paramount importance is the ability to welcome and embrace difference and creativity, upgrade pertinent social values of cultural diversity and social tolerance, promote innovation and effectively reflect and transmit such values through institutions. The conference will be interdisciplinary, problemoriented and policy-relevant. A broad range of questions and approaches are welcomed, particularly those that address main challenges Korea will face going forward.

Possible research topics include:

- Higher education, cultural diversity and development.
- Social cohesion beyond nationalism and multiculturalism.
- Entrepreneurial culture and innovation.
- Causes and consequences of rising inequality.
- Demographic changes, skilled foreign labor and education/work culture.

The conference will be held on April 22, 2016 at Stanford University. Beyond research presentations,

the conference also aims to foster connections among scholars with common interests. Travel (domestic or international economy class) and hotel costs as well as a modest honorarium will be covered for the presenters.
