This talk will examine limited political openings in the media in authoritarian contexts through the case study of China. Specifically, it will introduce the key findings from Dr. Repnikova's book project on the relations between China's critical journalists and the party-state in the past decade, under the Hu-Wen leadership. In a country renowned for censorship and pervasive propaganda, how do investigative journalists and editors at the nation's most liberal publications negotiate their role in the political system, and how does the party treat investigative journalism? The talk draws on one year of fieldwork in China and over 100 interviews with China's leading investigative journalists, party officials in charge of media regulation, and top media and crisis management experts. It explains the key characteristics of the relationship between the two actors, alludes to some shifts in the terrain that joins them under Xi's leadership, and draws some contrasts with state-media relations in contemporary Russia. More broadly, Dr. Repnikova theorizes about governance under authoritarian rule and the different modes of coexistence between critical actors and the state.

The talk extends arguments he developed in a paper entitled "Anonymous currencies or named debts? Comparison of currencies, local credits and units of account between China, Japan and England in the pre-industrial era" he published recently that will be precirculated on the website (<u>https://www.history.upenn.edu/calendar/penn-economic-history-forum</u>).

Prof. Kuroda works on the economic history of early modern China, in

particular looking at currency and trade networks. Through this his research also touches on the trade and currency routes between China and the Middle East, India, South East Asia, and even Mexican silver dollars in China in the late nineteenth/early twentieth century - all very transnational. So far he only has a couple of articles in English [attached just in case], but while he is at Harvard he mentioned he would be working on an English version of his book, Kahei shisutemu no sekaishi: hitaishousei wo yomu [貨幣システムの世界史: <非対称 性>を読む] [A global history of currency systems: Reading asymmetry].

Valerie Hansen teaches Chinese and world history at Yale, where she is professor of history. Her research draws on nontraditional sources to capture the experiences of ordinary people. In particular she is interested in how sources buried in the ground, whether intentionally or unintentionally, supplement the detailed official record of China's past.

In the past decade, she has spent three years in China: 2005-06 in Shanghai on a Fulbright grant; and 2008-09 and 2011-12, teaching at Yale's joint undergraduate program with Peking University. Having spent six plus years in China over her career, Valerie has visited at least 300 temples, climbed the Great Wall multiple times (once during a lightning storm), and posed next to the Terracotta Warriors eleven times. (All this in the company of her husband and three children!)

Her books include The Silk Road: A New History, The Open Empire: A History of China to 1600, Negotiating Daily Life in Traditional China, Changing Gods in Medieval China, 1127-1279, and Voyages in World History (co-authored with Kenneth R. Curtis).

* Ben Read, Associate Professor, UC Santa Cruz - "Neighborhood Politics in Urban Taiwan"

Taiwan's system of community-level governance has origins in institutions of local control employed by both the Nationalist Party (KMT), in its period of authoritarian rule, and before that the Japanese colonizers. In more recent times, the wardens (lizhang, 里長) of Taiwan's urban neighborhoods (li, 里) have come to play a complex set of roles, including those of government liaison, political party operative, and community representative. Neighborhood institutions remain heavily state-structured, however, in the warden system and in other respects. Focusing on Taipei with glances at other locales, this paper draws on ethnographic research, interviews, surveys, public records, and other sources. It explores the particular kind of political and civic engagement that the neighborhood governance system elicits. Warden elections are deeply democratic in ways that, in global perspective, are unusual for such ultra-local urban offices. Over the past 25 years, elections have become hotly contested, voter turnout has risen to remarkably high rates, and KMT dominance has partially given way to political pluralization. Citizens' participation in this setting, like others, often shows deep divisions along partisan lines, with wardens and local associations split by party loyalties. Finally, civic engagement with the neighborhood system shows an inverted class bias. It is in large part because of state structuring and support that Taiwan's li show such vibrancy and contrast in multiple ways with Western images of neighborhood politics.

Citizens and permanent residents of the United States are eligible to apply for a grant that supports their research, study, and/or creative work. Chigusa in Context: In and Around Chanoyu in Sixteenth-Century Japan (November 7-8, 2014)

The symposium will focus on the tea-leaf storage jar named Chigusa and the broader production and appreciation of the arts within which it thrived in the sixteenth century. The jar was made in China sometime in the thirteenth or fourteenth century as a utilitarian container, and only after arriving in Japan was it admired aesthetically, given its name, and employed as a respected storage vessel for tea. This elevation in status took place within chanoyu, the practice of drinking bowls of whisked powdered tea while in a specially designed architectural space equipped with a range of objects selected for the participants' appreciation. Chanoyu, however, was not pursued in isolation, and Chigusa and its admirers inevitably intersected with other artists and aspects of Japanese culture. Chigusa in Context will examine this expansive art world during the century of the jar's greatest acclaim.
