In 1776 publishers Tsutaya Jûzaburô and Yamazaki Kinbei issued *The Mirror of Yoshiwara Beauties, Compared* with sumptuous illustrations by two leading painters, Kitao Shigemasa and Katsukawa Shunshô. This three-volume album exploited the technology of multiple woodblock printing to represent the glamorous "beauties" of the licensed pleasure district, the Yoshiwara, in full color for the "floating world" (ukiyo). In this presentation I offer a new interpretation of this illustrated book by

returning the album to its period context. By looking closely at this book as a collaboration of publishers, artists, block carvers, and printers, I will examine how their contributions are both visible and hidden in the final work and how the work benefited from their cooperative enterprise. I will also demonstrate how the unnamed patrons are indicated through the book's representational strategies and how this work thus replicates their purpose to promote the licensed district as a place of refined entertainments. By reading the album against guidebooks to the district, as period readers would have, this talk further addresses how images and text encouraged the reader to behave as a connoisseur of all that is shown in its pages.

Boren Scholars are awarded up to \$20,000 for an academic year. The conventional wisdom among China watchers is that political reform in China has not kept pace with the wide-ranging economic reforms of the past few decades. China remains a classic example of a one-party authoritarian regime. However, most people in China believe the country is increasingly democratic, that it is already at least somewhat democratic, and that they are satisfied with the current level of democracy. How can that be? The answer to this puzzle begins with how democracy is defined. In this talk, Dickson examines how

democracy is defined by people in China. Knowing how people define democracy helps explain how democratic they think China is and whether they are satisfied with the level of democracy they currently have

have.

Thomas J. Christensen is William P. Boswell Professor of World Politics of Peace and War and Director of the China and the World Program at Princeton University. From 2006-2008 he served as Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for East Asian and Pacific Affairs with responsibility for relations with China, Taiwan, and Mongolia. His research and teaching focus on China's foreign relations, the international relations of East Asia, and international security. Before arriving at Princeton in 2003, he taught at Cornell University and MIT. He received his B.A. from Haverford College, M.A. in International Relations from the University of Pennsylvania, and Ph.D. in Political Science from Columbia University. Professor Christensen has served on the Board of Directors and the Executive Committee of the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations and as co-editor of the International History and Politics series at Princeton University Press. He is a life member of the

Council on Foreign Relations and a Non-Resident Senior Scholar at the Brookings Institution. In 2002 he was presented with a Distinguished Public Service Award by the United States Department of State.

Robert Ross is Professor of Political Science at Boston College and Associate, John King Fairbank Center for Chinese Studies, Harvard University. He received his B.A. in History from Tufts University in 1976 and his Ph.D. in Political Science from Columbia University in 1984. He also received graduate training in international relations at the London School of Economics and Political Science. Professor Ross's research focuses on Chinese security policy, nationalism and Chinese defense policy, East Asian security, and U.S.-China relations. His recent publications include Chinese Security Policy: Structure, Power, and Politics, US-China-EU Relations: Managing the New World Order, China's Ascent: Power, Security, and the Future of International Politics, and New Directions in the Study of Chinese Foreign Policy.

Over the last twenty years, China has urbanized faster and more than

any other country in history. This has resulted in tremendous (but uneven) prosperity, as well as worsening environmental and quality-of-life problems. Can better or different approaches to urban planning and development help Chinese cities "rebalance" their urban growth? How might such approaches be implemented? And what implications might they have for the rest of the world? PennDesign Dean Emeritus Gary Hack (who has taught planning and urban design in China for 20 years) and MIT Professor Jinhua Zhao (a co-founder of the China Planning Network) will discuss the past, present, and alternative futures of urban planning in China.

Huizong came to the Song throne in the first month of 1100, three months after his seventeenth birthday, and reigned almost twenty-six years, till the end of 1125. He was the most artistically accomplished of all Chinese emperors, talented especially at painting and calligraphy. His

all Chinese emperors, talented especially at painting and calligraphy. His decision to ally with the Jurchens against the Khitans failed spectacularly, however, and he and his kinsmen were taken into captivity in the far north. Since his reign ended so badly, traditional historians have viewed Huizong's many pursuits as his vices, not his virtues. His love of art was seen as self-indulgence, his faith in Daoism as self-delusion, his trust in Cai Jing as unwise and irresponsible. So long as one sets aside this moral framework, however, there are ample sources to look at Huizong and his reign afresh, to consider how he understood monarchy and its challenges, what he got from Daoism, how he made use of the resources of the throne, why he chose to ally with the Jurchen, and other related issues.

Henry Luce Foundation/ACLS Program in China Studies Predissertation Summer Grants, and Postdoctoral Fellowships - deadline to apply: November 12, 2013 **Predissertation grants** provide funding for graduate students to explore venues and make preliminary research arrangements, and to gain advice from potential collaborators regarding subsequent research in China.

Application essays must provide the rationale for the research agenda with particular attention to the evidence needed to answer research questions. The essay should present a rational for the need for a summer visit to China prior to dissertation research. It should also provide a plan for travel in China, identifying the individuals, institutions, and sites to be visited. Inclusion of correspondence with potential contacts in China is desirable. A working knowledge of Chinese is required.

Postdoctoral fellowships support work based on the applicant's research in China that aims to produce a scholarly text in English. A working knowledge of Chinese is required.

Stipends may be used for travel, living expenses, and research costs. Other support may be accepted (sabbatical leave or other grants) but the total received cannot exceed the 125% of the fellow's academic annual salary. There is no financial support for dependents.

Blakemore Freeman Fellowships and Refresher Grants - deadline to apply: December 30, 2013

Blakemore Freeman Fellowships are awarded for one academic year of advanced level language study in East or Southeast Asia in approved language programs (Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Vietnamese, Thai, Indonesian, Burmese or Khmer).

To be eligible for a Blakemore Freeman Fellowship, an applicant must:

- Be pursuing a professional, business, technical or academic career that involves the regular use of a modern East or Southeast Asian language
- Have a college undergraduate degree
- Be at or near an advanced level in the language as defined in the grant guidelines (Minimum requirement is 3 years of study of the language at college level or equivalent fluency)
- Able to devote oneself exclusively to full-time intensive language study during the term of the grant. Grants are not made for part-time study or research.
- Be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident of the United States

Blakemore Refresher Grants are intended to provide mid-career professionals an opportunity to refresh their language skills by attending a full-time language program for a summer or semester.

Applicants for Refresher Grants must meet all the eligibility requirements for Blakemore Freeman Fellowships, and be a member of one of the following groups:

- Former Blakemore Freeman Fellows;
- Professors who are teaching in an Asian field at a university or college in the United States;
- Professionals working in an Asian field.

Wit and humor have played an important role in art from ancient times to the present, sometimes transcending cultures. Humor, the basis of which often lies in breaking boundaries and flouting conventions, can provide amusement to a wide audience but also can convey hidden innuendoes intelligible only to the savvy few. What makes who laugh? What is humorous often depends on the point of view and context. What is humorous to some might be considered as insulting or deadly serious to others. Humor has also been used to disguise the dark and grotesque, inciting laughter at the expense of others. Similarly, the kitsch, the camp, and the cute frequently straddle the boundaries of play and humor. How do artists convey or visualize humor? Artists sometimes exploit political events, religion, elite culture, and social customs to provoke laughter. By visualizing the unconventional, deviating from established norms, or juxtaposing unexpected subjects and styles,

they can find innovative ways to display wit, humor, and play in their works. How can scholars decode, identify, and differentiate between humor, satire, farce, parody, and irony in playful works of art? Are there underlying messages encrypted in witty and unconventional works? What are the recurrent themes that might signal humorous intent? Do we laugh more or less, or at different times, over the years and centuries? This symposium invites keen minds to explore visual articulations of wit and humor in East Asia. Does the serious study of humor necessarily take the laughter out of it?

Enter your 300-400 word abstract for a chance to come to Princeton University, where we guarantee that your performance will not be met with rotten tomatoes.
