* Timothy Wai Keung Chan, Hong Kong Baptist University - "Magical Food and Spatiotemporal Displacement in Early Medieval Chinese Narratives"

This paper discusses how prevalent dietary beliefs contributed to the literary motif of spatiotemporal displacement in narratives written in early medieval China (approx. 2nd–5th centuries CE). In this repertoire of narratives, the stereotypical Chinese protagonist, unlike Rip Van Winkle, manages to survive his stay in a Shangri-La where time elapses significantly faster relative to the real world. The focus of the present study is the role of peach and sesame in facilitating the adventure of Liu Chen 劉晨 and Ruan Zhao 阮肇 in an account preserved in an early fifth-century anthology, Youming lu 幽明錄. We rely on recipes and records of life-prolonging diets in early anecdotal texts and Daoist scriptures to uncover how and when these foodstuffs were believed to have magical powers. We observe how these magical ingredients underpin the process of fantasy in this narrative, and in other similar narratives within this unique literary tradition of spatiotemporal journeys.

Location:	Stiteler Hall, B21 Since the 1990s, increasing numbers of South Korean immigrants have traveled to China in search of entrepreneurial opportunities. By and large, these South Korean immigrants have relied on the help of third- and fourth-generation Korean Chinese ethnic minorities to help ease the linguistic and cultural barriers they face in the PRC. Much of the secondary literature on this topic indicates that despite the fact that the South Korean entrepreneurs have access to the help of these Korean Chinese cultural intermediaries and also come with high levels of human capital, many face downward mobility. In contrast, the Korean Chinese ethnic minorities, despite their humble roots as members of agricultural communes in the rural northeastern part of China, have attracted much scholarly attention for their rapid rates of upward mobility through entrepreneurship in the enclave. My dissertation uses ethnographic and survey data on the Korean ethnic enclave in Beijing to examine what might account for these contrastive outcomes. In particular, I highlight how the enclave entraps the South Korean immigrants from acquiring the necessary cultural and linguistic skills to successfully run their businesses, while at the same time, providing the Korean Chinese ethnic minorities with access to a lucrative set of resources that they can effectively monopolize due to their culturally hybrid background. * James Joo-Jin Kim Program in Korean Studies Korean Studies Colloquium

Chinese and Japanese Lecturer - The Department of East Asian Languages and Literatures of the University of Pittsburgh seeks applications for the position of Lecturer, pending budgetary approval. The Anne van Biema Fellowship - deadline to apply: December 15, 2012

The Anne van Biema Fellowship was established by bequest to promote excellence in research and publication on the Japanese visual arts. Fellowships support research at the Freer Gallery of Art and Arthur M. Sackler Gallery of the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, DC. Research proposals are evaluated in terms of merit, originality, methodology, and potential for significant publication that will advance scholarly and public understanding of the Japanese visual arts. Interdisciplinary proposals with a primary focus on Japanese visual arts are considered.

Awards are made to scholars at the post-doctoral or equivalent professional level for periods of two to nine months, and are not renewable. The maximum stipend of \$33,750 for nine months will be prorated for shorter terms. The fellowship includes round-trip travel at US government rates from the fellow's residence to Washington, DC. Additional support not to exceed \$2,500 may be provided for approved research and travel expenses. Research space, a networked computer, and access to art collections, archives, and Smithsonian Institution libraries are provided.

The Anne van Biema Fellowship is intended to provide an environment conducive to research, writing, and collegial discourse. Fellows are expected to devote themselves full-time to the proposed project, to participate in the scholarly community and programs of the museums, and to present a research-in-progress seminar during the period of the appointment.

The fellowship is open to scholars of all nationalities. Meeting requirements for and obtaining required visas for residence and research in the United States is the responsibility of the applicant. Upon request, the museums will supply documentation of the award of the fellowship, dates of appointment, and financial support.

Application Deadlines

Fellowship applications are reviewed annually. Applications must be received by December 15. Notification of awards is sent on February 15. Appointments begin between April 1 and December 1 of the same calendar year.
